KLAMATH ELKS PROVE A SENSATION IN HUGE ELK PORTLAND PARADE

Portland Giving Royal Reception To Elks At Convention; Grand Exalted Ruler Price Lauds Work Of National Elks; Page Is Elected

PORTLAND, July 13.—(United with a purpose of making a contribution of their order to the upbuilding of the city of their order is evidenced by their citizenship of our country and to make are now carrying on in the United States. Patriotism, social and community welfare was the keynote of Price's annual message. He said he had found the dominant note of Elksdom to be expressed in welfare work and community enterprise.
"Let us send out our welfare committees," he said, in speaking of Americanization work, with forerunners, "and find these people
