

ELMER STREET GIVES BUT 2 HITS; PELICANS W Lively Ball May Be Deadened Through A Tougher Horseh

"LIVELY" BALL MAY BE DEADENED BY THICKER HORSEHIDE AND SEAM OF COARSER THREAD SAYS HEYDLER

Heydler Not Convinced That Livelier Ball Has Been Made In Past Few Months; Attributes Heavy Hitting To Changes Baseball Has Undergone; Making Changes To Stop Criticism

NEW YORK, July 13.—(United News)—An increase of a few thousandths of an inch in the thickness of baseball covers or the use of coarser stitchings were suggested as remedies for the so-called "lively ball" by President John A. Heydler, of the National league, in a statement made today.

Although Heydler said that this should stop all criticisms, he added that he was not convinced that a livelier ball was being used. Increased hitting and circuit drives have been blamed on the sprightliness of the ball. Heydler, reiterating former denials by manufacturers that specifications for the ball had been changed since a cork center became regulation in 1910.

Whatever the reason, the game certainly has changed in the last three or four seasons, he said. Hitting has been increased because the whole style of baseball has undergone a radical change.

It may be advisable to make the cover of the ball a trifle thicker or the stitching a bit coarser. I imagine if this were done the pitcher could once more put his stuff behind the ball and control his curves better. If we did that, however, many of the fans would protest that we had deadened the ball. But pitchers are skillful and quick to take advantage of every opportunity. The addition of a few thousandths of an inch to the thickness of the cover might revolutionize the science of baseball.

Yankees Have Practically Chosen 5 Stars To Go Up Into Big Time

NEW YORK, July 13.—(United News)—The New York Yanks have begun an extensive shopping campaign for players to bolster up their wrecked baseball machine, and are considering, as a start, five Pacific coast players, Ed Barrows, business manager for the Yanks, admitted today.

Ed Holly, chief scout for the American league team, which has slipped from top position to seventh place in the league standing in less than a season, has already lined up five Pacific coast league players in a systematic combing of far-west line-ups, Barrows said.

The men Miller Huggins desires to brace up his weak spots are:

Hal Rhyne, San Francisco, shortstop; Paul Waner, San Francisco outfielder; Jack Warner, Vernon third baseman; Tony Lazerre, Salt Lake shortstop, and Mervyn Shea, Sacramento catcher.

It was reported that negotiations for Rhyne, Waner and Warner had been completed. This, however, Barrow denied. He said that they were anxious to secure them, and that they would close deals only if the prices were reasonable.

The Yankees may have difficulty in bidding for Shea and Lazerre, it is believed.

\$40,000 For Shea

Shea is rated as the best catcher on the coast, and is hitting .355. The Sacramento club was offered \$40,000 for him a few weeks ago, but Detroit, the bidder, insisted upon immediate delivery. John McGraw also has his eyes on Shea and may compete with Huggins in his purchase.

Lazerre has had a rapid rise in the Pacific circuit and is batting .370 this season. Last season he tied for the league lead in the number of bases stolen.
