BUMPER CROPS ARE FORECAST

PORTLAND, July 14.—(United Press)—Oregon, Washington and Idaho, will produce fully 128,153,000 bushels of the three major cereal crops of the Pacific northwest—wheat, oats and barley—according to the estimate of Hyman H. Cohen, commercial editor of the Oregon Journal, who has just completed a two weeks' tour of the grain sections and presented the estimates in a special article today.

Washington will lead in wheat production this season, with approximately 40,073,000 bushels, he predicted, with Oregon producing 25,571,000 bushels and Idaho 24,534,000 bushels.

The total wheat production accordingly would be 89,478,000 bushels as compared with an estimated production of 64,435,000 bushels last season.

Other crop predictions were: Oats, Oregon 9,000,000 bushels; Idaho, 8,000,000 bushels; Washington, 7,000,000 bushels.

Barley, Oregon 5,900,000 bushels; Idaho, 4,675,000 bushels; Washington, 4,000,000 bushels.

Intoxicated Drivers Will Get No Mercy With Police Judge

Drivers who drink while driving, or drinkers who drive while drinking will receive the maximum penalty if they happen to come up before Police Judge Gaghagan. The judge declared late yesterday that intoxicated motorists were one class of people for whom he had no use.

The police judge has no intention, however, of adopting a uniform and harsher scale for auto violations. His policy in the future, he declared, will be governed, as before, by the circumstances applying to each individual case.

Charlie Beck exasperated Police Judge Gaghagan when he appeared in court for the fourth time on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. The judge felt so irritated that he sentenced Beck to a combination fine of \$25 and ten days in jail. Up to a late hour Tuesday evening Beck had not paid his fine and was faced with a twenty-two day term in consequence.

Frank Mitchell drew a \$20 fine for drunkenness from Police Judge Gaghagan yesterday. Mitchell failed to pay and handed service of a ten-day alternate sentence.

RAILROAD LOSES FIGHT TO STOP LOWERED RATES

SALEM, July 14.—The decision handed down by Circuit Judges McMahon and Kelly of this district today, which dissolves the injunction against the public service commission, obtained by the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company and other carriers, is considered one of the most important decisions ever handed down in the state.

The injunction restrained the public service commission from reducing rates 15 per cent on grain, grain products, potatoes, onions and straw.

In February, 1924, a temporary injunction was granted by the circuit court from attempting to enforce orders of the commission, which reduced the rates on the commodities mentioned, 25 per cent. Under a decision of the court at that time the reduction was changed from 25 per cent to 15 per cent, the differential on the Oregon-Washington R. & N. company eastern Oregon branches was eliminated. The courts declared that the rates prescribed were maximum rates only and the carriers are expected to establish point-to-point rates as occasion requires.

Of the 61 head taken, 48 belonged to the Ball ranch and the remainder were owned by Kittridge and Bill Lane, who live near the Ball ranch.

Rustler Bound Over
Gooderham is now in jail at Bend. He has, however, already been bound over to the federal court at Portland.

The three buckaroos who were helping Gooderham drive the cattle to Bend were released, as it was shown that they were merely working on salary and had no connection with the crime.

When Mrs. Alva Ball and Mrs. Amy Knight of the Ball ranch, returned home from the Gooderham hearing in Bend, they found their house had been entered and robbed during their absence. Henry Shadley, United States constable from Wood River, Amy Knight, Clarence Olds and Alva Helen Tice immediately started in pursuit of the thieves. They drove completely around the marsh and then back to Chilquin in their search, and finally discovered the hiding place of the robbers early last Sunday morning. The thieves threatened to fight, so the pursuers withdrew and returned the next morning.

Robbers Caught
The persons arrested—Fred Hood, Mrs. Bessie Hood, "Sundown" Jackson and Mrs. Jackson were brought to Klamath Falls late Monday evening and were bound over yesterday to the United States court under bonds of \$1,000 each. The case will come up for trial Thursday, July 23. The cattle taken by Gooderham have been returned to the Ball ranch, but the calves had had too much of hiking, and had to be brought back in a truck.
