

MOUNT LOGAN IN ALASKA FINALLY SCALED TO PEAK

CORDOVA, Alaska, July 15.—(United News)—Mount Logan, the second highest peak of North America, has been scaled successfully by a party of eight men, under the leadership of Capt. A. H. McCarthy of New York, members of the group declared upon their return here.

The mountain is situated in the southwestern corner of Yukon territory, Canada, close to the Alaskan boundary. Its height is 19,540 feet. Mount McKinley, in Alaska, is the only other American peak to eclipse its altitude, being 20,300 feet in height.

The hazardous climb to the top of Mount Logan was completed on June 23. The party originally consisted of nine men, but one of them did not reach the summit. But two of the party have reached Cordova, leaving here Tuesday on the steamer Alaska for Seattle.

One man, H. A. Lambert of Ottawa, is in the hospital at Chitina, suffering from frozen feet. After the descent, two of the group were left to bring in the pack train, while the rest floated on rafts down the Chitina river.

Two of these rafts, one bearing Capt. McCarthy, Foster and Carpe, have not been heard from, but no fears for the safety of the men are entertained. According to the men who passed through Cordova, weather conditions during the trip, after a few adverse days, were excellent.

AIRPLANES, BLOODHOUNDS, POSSE SEARCH FOR WOMAN PLAYWRIGHT

Cowboys Relentlessly Combing Lonely Canyon In Search Of Virginia Cookson Believed Slain As Result Of Bitter California Water Feud

SANTA ANA, Calif., July 15.—(United News)—While airplanes droned above, and bloodhounds ranged through the brush nearby, a human dragnet, formed by fifteen county prisoners joining hands, went over every foot of Orange lake Wednesday night without finding clues in the mysterious disappearance of Mrs. Virginia Lee Cookson, author, playwright and ranch owner.

At the same time 39 cowboys on horseback made an exhaustive search of lonely Modjeska canyon, near the entrance to which Mrs. Cookson's abandoned car was found Tuesday. The machine showed signs that a terrific struggle had taken place in it.

Strands of the woman's hair, her shoes, and a battered hat, were found in a clump of mesquite brush near the entrance to the canyon.

Sheriff Jernigan, who is conducting the search, declared that there were two possible solutions to the disappearance:

1. That Mrs. Cookson, who had been engaged in a bitter water feud in Modjeska canyon, was kidnaped by her enemies as the only means of ending the dispute.

2. That she had become temporarily deranged from fear of a mystery car driver, who had crowded her machine off the road on several occasions.

Airplane pilots who aided in the search for more than three hours, reported that they covered an area of ten square miles and failed to discover any tracks of the missing woman. The bloodhounds still are roaming the canyon.

Mrs. Mary McKeever told Sheriff Jernigan that her sister, Mrs. Cookson, was in deadly fear of the stranger, who had three times last week forced her car off the road at the same spot it was found abandoned.

WORMS THREATEN KLAMATH CROPS; HENDERSON GIVES EFFECTIVE CURE

Cut worms and army worms, which have been feasting upon Klamath county crops recently, will have an attack of acute indigestion if they include the following recipe in their diet. County Agent Henderson declares it is certain death for the greedy little wrigglers:

- 1 lb. arsenic or Paris green.
 - 15 lbs. bran.
 - 8 lbs. sawdust.
 - 1/2 gal. molasses.
 - 1 oz. amyl acetate (banana oil).
 - 3 to 4 gals. water.
- The arsenic, bran and sawdust should be mixed thoroughly when dry. Molasses, water and banana oil should be mixed and added to

the dry materials, stirring or shoveling over thoroughly until completely mixed. This amount of mash will cover approximately half an acre and should be used in the evening by broadcasting, preferably by hand after the sun has gone down. Half a dozen ground or crushed lemons can be substituted for the banana oil.

AGUINALDO PLEADS PASSIONATELY FOR P. I. INDEPENDENCE

MANILA, P. I., July 15.—(United News)—General Emilio Aguinaldo, famous Filipino leader, has renewed his pledge of help to the Filipino independence movement.

In an interview with the United News Wednesday, Aguinaldo referred to an article in the June issue of The World's Work, which described him as an ally of Leonard Wood, governor general of the Philippine Islands.

The article declared that "his (Wood's) extraordinary capacity was exemplified recently by his gaining Aguinaldo as an ally and by the lessening power of the leaders who demanded immediate independence."

"Never will I be an ally in the sense of cooperating with Governor Wood against the national aspiration of the Filipinos," said the native leader emphatically.

"I am an ally in the sense that, as a Filipino citizen, I believe that I should not begrudge my opinion on domestic affairs every time it is sought by constituted authorities."

"Fortunately, I haven't so far abdicated by convictions regarding the sacred and legitimate aspiration of my people to independence. Should I turn recreant to those convictions General Wood would be the first to lose faith in me and thereafter disregard my opinions."
