NATIONAL TAX REDUCTION

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon is bravely going before the people with his battle for tax reduction, and a late issue of Collier's carries an extended statement of the lines on which he is making his fight. Mr. Mellon says:

"There is to be no 'Mellon Plan' before the next congress... Whiting men are largely responsible for the fact that there was a 'Mellon Plan' a year ago.

"It (the 'Mellon Plan') might better have been called the 'Treasury Plan'... because since 1919... one Democratic President and two Democratic Secretaries of the Treasury have offered to Congress exactly the same recommendations for tax reform that I suggested....

"Experience shows conclusively that if taxes are too high the source of revenue diminishes. No man will continue to sow where he cannot reap.

"This condition cannot be escaped—more scientific taxes on the larger incomes or more taxes on the lower incomes.

"The man with small income is more interested than are the wealthy themselves in seeing that the tax upon high incomes and large estates is economically sound.

"... with tax-exempt securities being issued at the rate of more than \$1,000,000,000 a year, and with other means of escaping, the wealthy need no guardian."

Whether your tax bill is large or small, tax reform should result in keeping more money in your pocket.

FIRE LIABILITY COMMUNITY PROBLEM

Stock fire insurance companies have made it their concern to reduce destruction by fire, but it really is a matter for community action, since it affects every municipality and individual.

"It is the individual, as a rule, who, by carelessness, ignorance or crime, is responsible for the beginning of a fire, and the community which condones his act by permitting the existence of hazardous conditions in home, school or factory is the primary agency, which is really derelict in its responsibilities," says H. A. Smith, President of the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

All possible avenues of approach should carry the doctrine of fire prevention to the general public and to the various organizations of a business or social nature which make up our communities, enlisting the support of educational institutions and commercial bodies, to the end that each shall play its part in properly protecting the citizens of the community from fire loss.

It is not too much to assume that the devastation of the flames would have compelled the Federal and State Governments to enact laws for the suppression of fire and punishment of those having them, as in France, had not the private business of fire insurance made the reduction of fire waste its voluntary contribution to the public welfare.

TODAY'S RECIPES
 Creamed Chipped Beef—One-fourth pound chipped beef, one and one-half cups white sauce, pepper and salt to suit taste. Freshen chipped beef in boiling water if it seems too dry and salty. Add to white sauce made as follows: Two tablespoons butter, two tablespoons flour, two-thirds cup water, one-third cup condensed milk. Melt butter, stir in flour and mix thoroughly, add milk and water, stirring until thick and smooth. Add seasoning. One cup sweet milk may be used in place of water and condensed milk.

Fig Cookies—One cupful butter, two cupfuls sugar, two eggs separated, one cupful milk, one teaspoon orange extract, one teaspoon rose extract, three and one-half teaspoons baking powder, five and one-half level cupfuls flour, one level teaspoon salt. Filling: One pound figs, two level teaspoons grated orange rind, one orange, one cupful grape juice, one cupful honey, one cup water.

Method of making: Cookies—Beat butter and sugar to a cream, add yolks of eggs and beat well, add milk, extracts, whites of eggs stiffly beaten and flour sifted with baking powder and salt. Knead lightly on floured board and roll out very thin. Cut into shapes and spread half with the fig filling, place the other half on top and bake in a moderately hot oven for fifteen to twenty minutes. Filling: Wash figs and cut them into dice, put them into a saucepan with orange rind and strained orange and grape juice honey and water. Cover and simmer, stirring often until reduced to jam. Turn out to cool.

Cheese Omelet—Four eggs, four tablespoons cream or milk, one-fourth teaspoon salt, one tablespoon melted butter, one package cheese.

Beat eggs separately with salt and cream. Put butter into frying pan, then pour in the beaten eggs. Cook over low fire until well thickened but not too firm. Set pan under gas broiler or in oven until top of omelet is firm. Cover top of omelet with package cheese broken into small pieces. Replace on broiler until cheese is melted. Do not fold, but slip carefully on to a hot plate and serve immediately.
