

PAVING PROJECT NOW UNDER WAY

Bids For Second Big Quota Will Be Opened By Council Monday

Construction on the pavement of 16 miles of city paving work at a total of 18 blocks including streets and alley ways in the residential district of Klamath Falls was started today by the Western Construction company of Portland which holds a contract with the city for more than \$100,000 worth of work to be completed this summer.

The work consists of paving the following sections: Walnut street, beginning at Fourth, continuing in an easterly direction to Eleventh street; Fifth to Oak street; Seventh from Klamath to Oak; Eighth from Walnut to Oak; Ninth from Klamath to Oak; Eleventh from Klamath to Oak.

Bids for the completion of work for further improvements in the city will be opened on Monday evening. The bids will include paving East Main street from Main to Sixth street; Pine to High on Ninth; Esplanade east to Haron and north to Pacific Terrace.

With the completion of East Main street in Industrial or Mills Addition, it is quite probable that a business section will be built in that part of the city.

The telegram said that Robert confessed to the murder, that he would give himself up this morning.

The governor, fearing a hoax, but determined to spare a life if possible, had granted a week's reprieve for a period of investigation.

Scott's face darkened. A new light was in his eyes, perhaps the fear that both would hang. He was silent a moment.

"Damn him, I knew he would do that," was his comment. "Boys, I gave up hope three months ago when they brought me in here. Now there'll be more—of all this. I was ready to die."

He stopped.

What does a man think when he faces death at dawn? What does a man do? Russell Scott spoke again.

"Boys," he said, "I'd figured it was all over. I was going to play pinocle until daylight, rest a little—and then—"

"Let me alone now," he faltered. "I guess I'll go to sleep."

EXPLOSION KILLS 5 ON CALIF. RANCH

PRINTER, Calif., July 16.—(United News)—Five members of the H. G. Schroeder family were killed early Thursday when an explosion destroyed their ranch house, three miles from here.

Authorities have not determined the cause of the blast, although first reports were that a bomb had been placed in the house.

PIRATES BOW TO GIANTS IN HECTIC PENNANT SEARCH

PITTSBURGH, July 17.—(United News)—After hanging onto top honors through two series with the heaviest competition in the league the Pirates have been knocked into second place by the weakest team in the National circuit.

A crushing defeat by the Braves Thursday ended the Pirates' stay in first place and returned that of the Giants. But Pittsburgh's defeat was not even honorable. The game at Boston, where the Pirates also lost Wednesday was loosely played, each side making four errors and lasting 18 innings until Genewick scored on a single by Hood, a rookie second baseman. The game ended 9 to 8.

Meantime the Giants again won over the Cards, 7 to 5. Wayland Dean pitching all the way and allowing seven hits.

The Phillies jumped two steps in the league standing Thursday, going from sixth into fourth by virtue of Clarence Mitchell's 3 to 1 shut out of the Cubs. The Dodgers added the Phillies by defeating the Reds, 5 to 1.

Philadelphia continued its successful invasion of the west by winning another contest from the White Sox, this time by a score of 12 to 3. The Senators still found it difficult to defeat the Tigers, but managed it after 18 innings, winning 1 to 1.

The Yanks lost another game, the Indians making up for the result of Wednesday by winning 17 to 9.
