FACE TO FACE WITH THE "JAP" SITUATION

The citizens of Toledo, Ore., have been brought face to face with the "Jap" labor question for the first time and, having had the opportunity to view the disastrous results which have followed in the wake of such alien encroachments in other industrial centers, they have handled the situation in a firm and forceful manner.

TODAY'S RECIPES

Hamburg, Southern Style—Have your butcher grind one pound of round steak, season it as for plain hamburger (including onion if you like) add to this one cup of washed uncooked rice, make this into patties. Put it in the skillet and add one small can of tomatoes and one cup of cold water, one-quarter teaspoon paprika, one-half teaspoon of sugar, one-half teaspoon of salt. Let it come to boil, then place it on back of stove and let it simmer. Turn over when half done (this takes one hour) but keep watching it, as it burns very easily.

Cornmeal Muffins—Take one cup cornmeal, one-half cup flour, one teaspoon salt, one tablespoon baking powder, one cup milk, two tablespoons of syrup, two tablespoons melted butter and one egg.

Fruit Salad—Combine any canned fruit, cut in pieces with cherries, oranges and bananas, and top with whipped cream, or use various juices.

SUGGESTIONS

In dusting, washing windows, using polish on furniture and floors, use a pair of large tweezers with a good point, protect the point with a cloth so there will be no scratches, and any corner can be absolutely free from any dust or dirt.

Tweezers can be had at a small cost and the work of cleaning be made lighter.

If cream is not procurable this makes a fairly good substitute: Heat two cups of milk and infuse into it the rind of one lemon. Beat the yolks of two eggs with one teaspoon of flour and one or two table-spoons of cream, and when the milk is near boiling point pour it onto the eggs. Return all to the sauce-

pan, whisk over the fire until thick as cream, then take it off and as it cools add half a teaspoon of vanilla. Another cream substitute is to pour slowly a little hot water onto a well beaten fresh egg and flavor as desired.

Handle silk hosiery gently. More silk stockings are ruined by careless handling than are ever worn out in actual service. The right way to put on a silk stocking is to roll it down to the heel, then draw it over the foot, smoothing gently over the toes and heels, and finally unrolling the length of the stocking evenly. The wrong way is to pull or "drag" a stocking on. Threads are sure to be broken sooner or later and disastrous "ladders" started.

Roughness on the top of the kitchen stove may be removed by using sandpaper. Do this before putting on blacking.

THE BEST OF ADVICE

When we grumble about the vanity of all human things, inasmuch as even the noblest works are not eternal but must become sooner or later as though they had never been, we should remember that the world, so far as we can see, was made to enjoy rather than to last.

The thought is Samuel Butler's. You will find it elaborated on in his note books, which are available in book form.

Reflect and it is apparent that come-and-go pervades everything of which we have knowledge, and though great things go more slowly, they are built up of small ones.

Butler asks: "Are we to have our enjoyment of Handel and Shakespeare (for instance) weakened because a day will come when there will be no more of either Handel or Shakespeare nor yet of ears to hear them?" and he answers with another question: "Is it not enough that they should stir such countless multitudes so profoundly and kindle such intense and effectual admiration for so many ages as they have done and probably will continue to do?"

"The life of a great thing may be so long as practically to come to

immortality even now, but that is not the point," he says.

"The point is that if anything was aimed at all when things began to shape or be shaped, it seems to have been a short life and a merry one, with an extension of time in certain favored cases, rather than a permanency of even the noblest."

When one comes to think of it, death and birth are so closely related that one could not destroy either without destroying the other at the same time.

It is extinction that makes creation possible.

If, however, any work is to have long life it is not enough that it should be good of its kind.

Many ephemeral things are perfect in their way.

It must be of a durable kind as well.
