disposed of the property have been solicited to look into the matter of providing transportation for some 1,235,000 tons of ore from the Grey Eagle mine to the Southern Pacific. For the last four months I have been looking into the subject and have about concluded if I can get a free right-of-way, say about 25 feet, through the patented lands along the Klamath river from in the vicinity of Hornbrook to somewhere near Happy Camp to undertake the construction of a 30 inch narrow gauge railway.

"It may be possible that someone will come along in a few years and wish to construct a standard gauge line down the river and if so I will agree with the supervisors, chamber of commerce or anyone else to let them have the line I would build for 25 per cent in excess of what the narrow gauge cost together with interest on the money invested at the rate of six per cent and let them, in addition, buy their own right-of-way from the land owners to make the 100 feet that is generally required. If I am given a free right for my line, not exceeding 30 feet at any place and 25 feet in most all cases.

To Be Common Carrier

"I would like to have permission of the board of supervisors to use the old county line on the south side of the Klamath river where the state highway is in operation. I would like to have the proposition considered by those interested in seeing the improvement made, as provision will be made to handle business as a common carrier.

"The mining company is not interested other than offering the freight. The proposition is being financed by myself and a few friends."

The board of supervisors will meet here Friday as a board of equalization and it is possible that the members will consider the application then. If no action is taken Friday, the matter will not come before the board until August 3 at the regular monthly meeting.

ARCTIC EXPEDITION PUSHING NORTHWARD

KLAMATH COUNTY'S SCHOOLS WILL SHOW BIG IMPROVEMENT IN FALL

Bids To Be Opened Monday On Lamm's Mill And Chiloquin Additions; New Building At Sprague; Fairview And Mt. Laki To Be Consolidated; Merrill High To Be Enlarged

Improvement in the Klamath county schools ready for the opening of the fall term in September, is well under way, according to County School Superintendent Fred Peterson, who has called a meeting of the Klamath county school board for Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock in his offices in the court house.

Bids will be opened at this time for the additional rooms to be built to the Lamm's mill and Chiloquin schools.

Other bids to be opened include offerings for the new building to be erected at Sprague River, half way between the mill and the town, in order to accommodate both the residents of the mill section and those of the town.

Other improvements throughout the county include the consolidating of the Mt. Laki and Fairview school districts, when the Fairview school is being moved to the Mt. Laki district in order to accommodate the two sections. The building is large enough to accommodate the 40 pupils and the two teachers, merging the two sections into one and

facilitating the accommodations for both. The Fairview quarters will be arranged for until a permanent building is erected in the future.

A meeting of the Merrill high school board on Thursday evening resulted in an order to enlarge the Merrill school in order to place the entire grade schools on the lower floor, and the high school section in the upper floors of the building. The board voted to co-operate and assist the county district in order to improve the building to this extent. The uncompleted rooms in the building will be completed in order to make the proposed accommodations.
