

# Jack Dempsey May Fight Title Bout With Greb In September

## JACK DEMPSEY WILL FIGHT TITLE BOUT WITH HARRY GREB, IS "DOPE"

"Windmill Harry" Thinks He Can Lick Dempsey And Jack Is Willing To Let Him Try And Prove It—Bout Would Be Held At Michigan City In Sept.

CHICAGO, July 21.—(United News)—James Mason, manager of Harry Greb, middleweight champion, has announced that arrangements are being made for a bout between Greb and Jack Dempsey.

The announcement was made to the United News Tuesday evening during a conference between Floyd Fitzsimmons, promoter, and Mason.

According to Mason, the bout would be held in September, at Michigan City, Ind. The heavyweight title would be at stake, Mason declared.

Fitzsimmons said that he is negotiating with Bartley Madden and Jack Remick, heavyweights, for matches with Dempsey.

Mason and Greb arrived here from Pittsburgh Tuesday enroute to Columbus, Kas., where Greb is scheduled to inaugurate the passage of the Kansas boxing law in a 19 round bout with Billy Britton, Thursday.

A last minute change in travel plans was made when Mason learned that Fitzsimmons wanted to negotiate with him for a bout with Dempsey.

Fitzsimmons is to communicate with Dempsey Wednesday in Salt Lake City regarding Tuesday night's conference and on Mason's return to Chicago next week another conference will be held with a definite date and the number of rounds will be discussed.

Dempsey is willing to meet Fitzsimmons told the United News. Greb expressed confidence that he could wrest the heavyweight championship crown from Dempsey "if given a show." He emphasized that he was able to handle Dempsey when he was his sparring partner prior to Mike-Dempsey bout at Benton Harbor four years ago.

"Dempsey was unable to hit me consistently in any of our four round practice bouts then, and I'm a better man today than when I was a leather pusher in Dempsey's camp," he said.

"I beat Bill Brennan, one of the most formidable heavyweight fighters, with ease each of the four times that I met him," he continued. "Jack Dempsey took 12 rounds to administer his knockout poison to Brennan in the only bout they ever had. That, I believe, contrasts our ability and shows that I am capable of being heavyweight champion."

## SENATORS AND GIANTS JUMP INTO FIRST PLACE, SHOVING ATHLETICS AND PIRATES INTO 2ND POSITION

Miller Huggins Gives Up Hope Of Yanks Getting Anywhere This Year; "We Need Pitchers And Hope To Come Back Next Year"

NEW YORK, July 21.—(United News)—Two second place teams moved into the major league leaderships Tuesday without even so much as appearing on the diamond to fight for the honors. The Senators, who were idle, went to the top of the American league, and the Giants, who were rained out at the Polo Grounds, passed the Pirates in the National league competition.

Clarence Mitchell, southpaw spit-ball hurler of the Phils, accounted for the defeat which placed the Giants back at the top. Mitchell held the Pittsburgers to four hits, including a home run by Moore and a triple by Cuyler. No two hits came in one inning. At the same time the Phils hit Kremer seven times. George Harper was responsible for three of them, a homer and two singles, which drove in two runs.

The Cubs appearing in Boston defeated the Braves 13 to 1. The Reds were scheduled to play the Giants.

The Browns were responsible for the Athletics loss of the American league honors. The Marksmen made 11 hits, while the St. Louis team made only 9, but aside from a rally in the 8th inning when they scored 4 runs they were unable to concentrate their fire, losing the game, 5 to 3.

The victory put the Browns into a tie for third place with the White Sox who broke even on a double program with the Red Sox, the first game going to Boston 4 to 5, and the second to Chicago, 3 to 2.

The Yanks rounded out their most disastrous western trip by winning from the Tigers, 5 to 4. This gave the Tanks their fifth victory.

"We need two more pitchers, a catcher and an infielder," Miller Huggins manager of the club announced Tuesday, "we can't get them this year and our hopes are for a come-back next season."

### SPORTS DONE BROWN

A few weeks ago I wrote rather enthusiastically of a little brown fighter, Pete Sarmiento. I had just seen him baffle the clever, cunning little ring general, Carl Tremaine, for 12 rounds when the betting was 10 to 1 that Tremaine would drop him in the first couple of rounds.

The other night he met Charley Phil Rosenberg, newly crowned bantamweight of the world. And stocky little Pete bore out my expectations when he gave the so-called champion a boxing lesson for 12 rounds. He made Rosenberg look like the cheesiest of champions—outboxed and out-gamed him throughout the mill.

He proved two things conclusively in that battle. First, that he is no little fighter.

Second, that Rosenberg is not as clever as he is advertised to carry the title over.

## PELICANS HARDEST HITTERS IN LEAGUE; BAD FIELDING AND HURLER SHORTAGE HAMPER

Team Has Averaged 14 Hits For Last 4 Games, Sold Tops Team Batting With Average of .300 And Mathews Hit Safely In 9 Consecutive Games

A team that can hit on a par with any team in the league but a team that is weak in fielding and weak in hurlers. That seems to be the failing of the Pelicans as they settle down on the last lap of the Siskiyou-Klamath pennant race.

For the past four games the Pelicans have had a batting average of the entire league, with an average of 14 hits per game. Yet, poor fielding and lack of reliable hurlers have enabled them only to get a 50-50 break in the series with two wins and two losses. In both these last two games, Yreka and Weed—had a relief pitcher been available a different story might have been told. Errors have been made.

Of the nine games played the Pelicans have gone through but two games playing errorless ball. They have shown a marked decline in fielding ability in the last four games, too. Eight errors in the Yreka game and six in the Weed game almost tell the tale of defeat. It's the games the boys field poorly in that are lost.

Bert Arnold is leading the Pelicans in individual batting with an average of .459. Doc Noel and Mathews have hit safely in nine straight games, an accomplishment that is the honor of only two other players in the entire league.

The batting averages to date do not tell the whole story. Mickey Demitt and French Baynes are shown down toward the tail end.
