County Health Director Newsom is righteously indignant. The situation is simply this: Ferd Krentlar, an employe of the Warren Construction company, working in the Crater lake national park, acquired a full blown case of mumps. Although he was taken ill outside of Klamath county and inside a government reserve, he was placed, like a founding child, upon the doorstep of the county health unit. Krentlar was a member in good standing of the National Hospital association, which undertakes to care for all members taken ill, unless such illness happens to be communicable. The National Hospital association, therefore, refused to provide adequate facilities for Krentlar and the county health service placed him in a tent near the infirmary. Bright Prospect For Klamath Says Barnes

"In years not far in the future," declared Barnes, "Klamath Falls will be stepping from her cloak of township to that of a city with a population five times larger than she boasts now. This growth must be taken care of and plans for that expansion must be made now."
