Attack Is Made On "Undraped Figures"

SAN FRANCISCO, July 22.—(United News)—An attack upon the "undraped figures" of mythology has been started in California.

The state board of education, now in session here, has been asked to banish illustrations of Venus, Apollo and other classic figures of ancient Greece and Rome, from text books now being used in public schools.

The Rev. "Bob" Shuler of Los Angeles, described as a clergyman of the "sensational" type, is leading the attack. He claims that the "undraped figures" are "suggestive" and excite "curiosity" among students of tender years.

Shuler has gained an ally in Charles A. Storke of Santa Barbara, a member of the board. Storke declared Wednesday that he considered the illustrations "highly immoral."

The question is to be debated Thursday, when the board of education is to pass upon text books for the coming year.
