a hobo, a shabby figure in the smoked-velvet half light of a drug store that was a bootlegger's rendezvous.

His wife, who had left him to seek to support their three children returned to his side when the state claimed Scott's life. In the picture of the days of her struggle has come Thomas Scott, father of the condemned man who for the last week has sought one son, that he might go to the gallows while his other son went free.

Catherine Scott's struggle, and the pleas of innocence of her husband, aroused nation-wide sympathy. Hundreds of letters urging that Scott be reprieved have deluged Illinois officials. Funds were raised last week for his defense, both in the United States and Canada. Scott and father broadcasted radio appeals this week, urging that Robert Scott come forward—from the port of missing men—and save his brother's life.

All was in vain. For Scott had been tried, found guilty, sentenced to pay with his life for the life of the boy, Maurer. The gallows that was erected a week ago, had not been taken down. Through the period of feverish effort it stood, a symbol of death black in the dusk of the prison.

At 6 a. m., Friday the guards will call Scott to begin the death march through prison corridors to where the gallows waits.

As dawn breaks fresh above the city the prisoners of the county jail awaiting, knowing the moment of death will hear the sharp thud of the trap, sprung beneath the dangling feet of Scott, who once was a millionaire.

SWAMPSCOTT, MASS., July 23.—President Coolidge will not interfere with the plans of the state of Illinois to exact the life of Russell Scott on the gallows Friday for the murder of a Chicago drug clerk during a robbery.

BIG EXPANSION OF KLAMATH ICE AND COLD STORAGE PLANT TO BE COMPLETED WITHIN A FEW WEEKS

With the completion of the brick building now being erected near the plant of the Klamath Ice and Storage company, a period of additional expansion for that concern will be started.

The building, which will be ready for occupancy about the middle of August, will house the offices and storerooms of the Pacific Fruit & Produce company. The building will be leased to the Pacific Fruit and Produce company by the Klamath Ice and Storage company, which will also maintain two ice-cold storage rooms for keeping fruits and vegetables.

The Klamath Ice and Storage company now owns and operates the White Pelican Mineral Springs bottling works, and supplies refrigerating facilities to the Wood-Curtis Produce company, the Ennis-Brown Produce company, Sanitary market and Truelove market.

The building occupied by the Ennis-Brown company is also owned by the ice company. The building contains two storage rooms, one each being leased to the Sanitary market and the Ennis-Brown concern. The two rooms are cooled by an automatic refrigerating machine of latest design, which stops running when the temperature has reached 33 degrees, and starts operating when the thermometer registers 35.

Klamath Falls residents need have little fear of an ice shortage, as the company has over one hundred tons of ice held in reserve for emergencies, and manufactures daily a total of nearly 22,000 pounds. The ice is formed in a tank of 112 cans, each containing 420 pounds, and a pipe of circulating air runs into each tank. The bubbling air makes the ice clear and semi-transparent.

The bottling works adjoining the ice plant is one of the finest in the

southern section of Oregon, and the northern portion of California. The interior is finished in cement and is thoroughly cleaned with water every day. A large washing machine, handling over one thousand bottles an hour, cleans them with as much care and as thoroughly as the most scrupulous housewife in Klamath county. Territory from Mt. Hebron on the south, to Beaver Marsh on the north, is served by this industry.

Under pressure, the bottling works can turn out as many as twenty-five cases of soda water an hour for an average, and as high as thirty-five cases an hour has been reached.

The officers of the Klamath Ice and Storage company are A. M. Collier, president; Fred Fleet, vice-president and secretary, and O. L. Carter, superintendent.

Reunited with his family, J. Kufeldt laughed last night at the report that he had deserted his family, taking with him \$1,000 in savings and his automobile.

Kufeldt's absence from his home and fireside was strictly involuntary. He was arrested on a charge of drunkenness by Indian officers near the Williamson river bridge in the reservation and was held incommunicado for several days. When his identity was established, Kufeldt was released.

Collins disappeared Monday night, while his family waited for him to return from the railway station where he had gone to buy tickets to Scotland. It was disclosed then that Collins had found on arriving at the station that the train left earlier than he had expected. He gave the porter a note to his wife and the porter kept both the tip and the note in his pocket. The police found the professor after locating the porter.
