

ENGLAND VERGES ON NATION WIDE MINER WALKOUT

LONDON, July 24.—(United News)—Coal miners and mine owners have agreed to meet in joint conference Wednesday in an effort to prevent a strike of 1,000,000 miners.

This agreement represents a triumph for W. C. Bridgeman, the government intermediary in the coal dispute, who until Friday had tried unsuccessfully to bring the disputants around a single council table. Bridgeman managed to bring the owners and miners together for a short conference Friday, and it was announced that the joint talks would be resumed Wednesday.

The other development of the day in the labor situation was the convention of a group of delegates representing 600,000 skilled trades unionists, who were called together in extraordinary session to discuss the unemployment situation. The workers bitterly assailed the capitalist system of industry.

A. B. Swales, president of the trades union congress, who presided, excoriated British employers for their policy of reducing wages to remedy the industrial situation. He said reductions were stupid and futile, because they reduce the purchasing power of the great mass of consumers.

"The capitalists," Swales continued, "are intellectually bankrupt in face of the present difficulties. I warn the governing classes that there is a limit to the workers' endurance and forbearance."

Must Stand Pat

A. J. Cook, secretary of the miners' union, was equally harsh. He appealed for support to protect the miners' standard of living, and to help them obtain a living wage. He said that in ten years the mine owners had received a profit of \$15,000,000 and that \$20,000,000 had gone as royalties to the owners of the land.

"In the event of a strike," Cook said, "the miners will protect the pits from damage, as they hope to own the mines some day, and do not want them destroyed."

The delegates cheered loudly when Cook concluded his statement of the mine situation, with an appeal for help.

When the miners and owners meet Wednesday Bridgeman will endeavor to find a basis for negotiations, as both owners and miners will enter the conference chamber retaining their own points of view, which resulted in the issuance of a strike order Thursday.

Shipping Tied Up
Members of the transport union will meet Saturday to insure that no coal would be transported anywhere in England, Scotland or Wales in the event of a strike. Monday a delegation from the trades union congress will see Premier Baldwin to discuss unemployment in general, and the mine situation in particular.

TRIBUTE IS PAID KLAMATH BY HEAD LOS ANGELES CHAMBER COMMERCE

R. W. Fridham, president of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce, was among the prominent visitors in the city yesterday, arriving from the south to enjoy a visit in the Klamath country, and at the Crater lake resort. Fridham is accompanied by his family.

While in Klamath Falls yesterday the visitor called at the chamber of commerce and was loud in his praises of the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway.

"It would be very sad to think of spoiling that beautiful highway," declared Fridham, "by destroying it with the necessity of making a paved road of it and cutting out a natural beauty along the way."

"I have been instrumental in obtaining the presence of many of the California highways and byways and have never seen so attractive a nat-

ural dirt highway as that which I passed over in my trip from Ashland over the Green Springs mountains to Klamath Falls."

Fridham continued in his expression of appreciation in the scenic beauty of the road to the valley. He is one of the first good roads advocates in southern California, and in the year 1910 was a member of the board of supervisors of Los Angeles.

The chamber of commerce building in Los Angeles has been but recently completed, taking in an entire block, according to the visitor.

On his way north, Fridham and his party are enjoying a trip to Crater lake, then north to Washington, where he will inspect several paper mills in which he is interested. The party plans to go as far north as Banff, Canada.

Long Beach To Have Its Bathing Beauty Parade

LONG BEACH, Calif., July 24.—The Long Beach council, which was to decide whether or not to enact an emergency ordinance prohibiting a bathing beauty parade August 8, gave up in despair when rival factions drowned out the proceedings with cheers and jeers.

Church factions, which claimed the parade was "shameful and an insult to the moral people of Long Beach," were greeted by loud cries of "evil is to him who evil thinks."

When there seemed little possibility of settling the matter quietly, the council graciously side-stepped the issue by postponing action until Tuesday.

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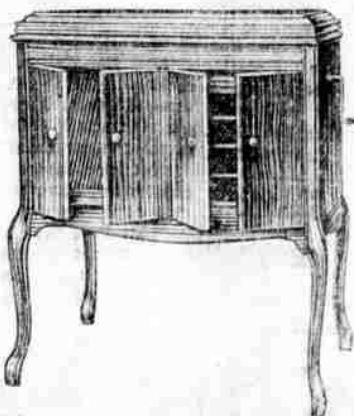
