Returns—Mrs. George Barnhart has returned to Klamath Falls after an enjoyable vacation trip spent in San Francisco with friends and relatives.

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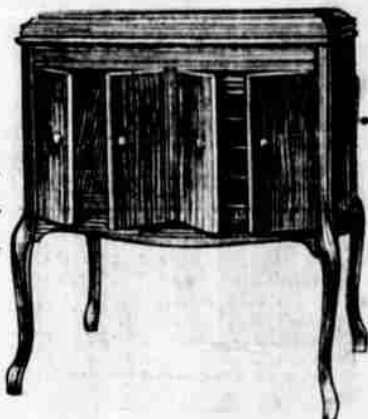
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
