THE LAW OF COMPULSION, DO WE WANT IT?

Insurance today is purchased without the pressure of public authority. Premiums are voluntary payments made by the buyer for protection to his person or property, or both. It is this absence of compulsion and enervating influence of bureaucracy which has permitted insurance to develop freely and to become a potent factor in the social and industrial development of the last century. To change insurance from the status of a voluntary association for self protection to the status of an involuntary association for protection of others means the prostitution of insurance to meet political needs and class demands. If insurance can be made compulsory and used for the purpose of providing indemnity for certain highway accident victims, it may be made compulsory in a variety of other situations.

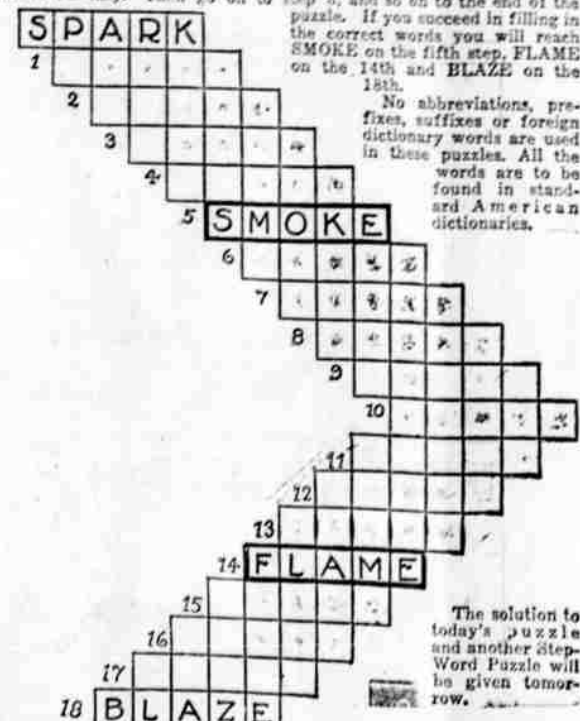
FROM SPARK TO BLAZE IN 18 STEPS.

Watch your step and the definitions below in solving this puzzle. Can you change SPARK into BLAZE in 18 simple little one-letter moves?

Some of the steps may be easier than others. For example, we start from the word SPARK. To reach step 1 all you have to do is to think up a word differing in one letter only from SPARK and meaning "to refrain from using or injuring." That is very simple. The answer, of course, is SPARE.

Set down the word SPARE in the five squares on the first step down, opposite Figure 1, one letter to each square. That completes step 1.

Now for step 2. Think up a five-letter word differing in only one letter from SPARE and meaning "a church steeple." That, also, should be easy. Then go on to step 3, and so on to the end of the puzzle. If you succeed in filling in the correct words you will reach SMOKE on the fifth step, FLAME on the 14th and BLAZE on the 18th.

TODAY'S RECIPES

Charivari of Meat and Spaghetti
 Measure one-half pound of ground round steak slowly with one tablespoon of finely chopped onion; one tablespoon of finely chopped green pepper, salt and pepper to taste, add two cups of stock, for 20 minutes. Cook one-half pound of spaghetti in boiling water for 15 minutes. Mix meat with one-fourth cup of bread crumbs, two beaten eggs and the spaghetti. Steam in a greased mold for 40 minutes and serve with tomato sauce.

Baked Onion—Wash large onions. Boil in salted water for an hour, adding boiling water as it boils away. Dry onions and roll each one in a piece of buttered wafer paper, twisting at the top to keep it closed. Bake slowly for an hour or until tender all through. Peel and put in a deep dish and brown slightly for 15 minutes. Season and pour melted butter over them.
