

Sid Terris Winner Over New Aspirant

NEW YORK, July 28.—U. S.—Sid Terris was awarded the judges' decision over Charley O'Connell of Cleveland after their 10-round encounter Monday night at the Queensboro stadium.

In a fast fight in which neither contender was able to lay out the other, Terris was given the decision on aggressiveness and speed. He eliminated O'Connell as a dangerous lightweight contender by his showing Monday.

In the semi-final Harry Felix and Joe Glyck fought 12 rounds to a draw.

WORM MENACE IS ABOUT OVER

Encouraging Reports From All Points; Poison Very Effective

The Klamath county court house was invaded by the conquering cut worms early yesterday morning.

About 4,000 captive wrigglers in the office of the county agent freed themselves from their prison chambers and went on a tour of investigation.

The worms, held in two boxes covered with cloth, cut through the cover and began to inspect Tom Tracy's domicile. In search of information and something to eat, the worms crawled all over the court house basement. Locked doors were no obstacle, the worms went under them. Decks, floors, chairs and tables were covered with the runaways when workers in the court house reported for duty.

Brooms and dust pans were hastily called into action, and the invasion was checked before the worms made the office furniture antique by boring holes through desks and chairs.

Experts Are Here
The government experts who are assisting local agricultural agents in fighting the cut worm invasion, spent yesterday near Algoma and Fort Klamath.

The first report of grain infestation by the worms came from Algoma. Heretofore the worms have confined their activities to the second growth of alfalfa.

Trucks from Merrill and Malin arrived in Klamath Falls yesterday and were loaded with supplies of

poison for the community mixing stations at those points.

According to reports reaching the office of the county agent, poison has given relief from the worms within forty-eight hours after its distribution.

ENGLISH PRESS IS HARSH WITH BRYAN

LONDON, July 28.—A harsh recapitulation of William Jennings Bryan's career appears in a London Times editorial. The editorial says in part:

"Mr. Bryan's career as secretary of state in the early days of the war revealed his utter incapacity to conduct large political questions, as was likewise revealed in the Mexican situation. When there was talk of Mr. Bryan coming to lecture in Europe early in 1914, Walter Hines Page (at that time American ambassador to Great Britain) wrote to Colonel E. M. House: 'It would take years for the American ambassador to recover the ground lost if Bryan carries out his plan.'"

"By his retirement after the sinking of the Lusitania, he delivered the world from very serious danger."

AIRPLANES JOIN IN ATTACK ON RIFFS

LONDON, July 28.—Twenty-three French airplanes bombed villages behind the el Krim lines following a hand-to-hand battle between French troops and swarms of Riffians near Taffrant, according to a dispatch from Fez to the Daily Express.

The bombed villages belong to the Deroual tribe, which recently has been unusually active against the French.
