Cubs Beat Rookie Giant Greenfield

CHICAGO, July 29.—(United News)—Kent Greenfield, the promising youngster, who had been winning games for the Giants, failed to hold the Cubs in Chicago today, and as a consequence, the New York machine slipped back to a position just two and a half games behind the Pirates.

Neither the Giants nor Pittsburgh faced competition. However, with the aid of a break in the fifth inning, in which seven runs were scored, the Pirates defeated Boston 8 to 6, while the New York team lost to Chicago 4 to 2.

The Reds also strengthened their lead over the Dodgers by beating the Phillies, making their record for the season against the Philadelphia team on their home grounds perfect. The score at Cincinnati was 9 to 5. At St. Louis the Dodgers lost to the Cards 10 to 3.

With George Sisler and Ken Williams out of the St. Louis lineup, the Yanks were able to win a game today after a battle lasting 12 innings. The Browns tied the score in the ninth, in the tenth both scored two runs. A run in the last of the twelfth gave the Yanks an 8 to 7 victory. Six Brown errors were advantageous to the New Yorkers.

The Senators puffed through seven innings behind the White Sox, but were able to maintain their position a game and a half behind the Athletics by putting over four runs in the eighth inning, winning 8 to 6. At the same time, Philadelphia was defeating Detroit 10 to 2. Cleveland won from Boston 10 to 5.

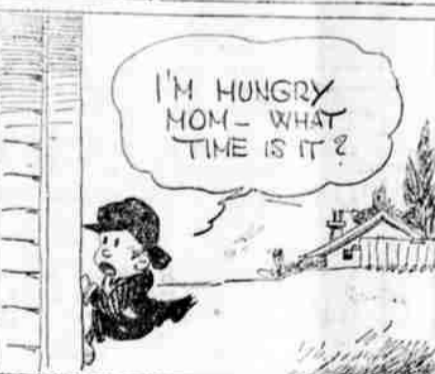

BRYAN REMAINS REST IN CHURCH OF PRESIDENTS

WASHINGTON, July 29.—The body of William Jennings Bryan will lie in state at the church of the presidents here Thursday, so that thousands who admired and loved him may file solemnly by the casket and pay a final tribute.

Although Mrs. Bryan has not given her final consent, Ben C. Davis, the commoner's former secretary, has gone ahead with his plans on the assumption that Mrs. Bryan would not object.

It is planned to move the body to the New York avenue Presbyterian church where Lincoln and nine other presidents worshiped, from the undertaking parlors, where it will be

taken upon arrival here today morning.

The church from which the body will be taken is an ancient structure. Hundreds have already for places at the funeral. Thousands are expected about the church and its streets to Arlington.

The funeral Friday will be in accordance with the wishes of Bryan. It is doubtful if he will ever consent to have his body taken to a public place. A guard is expected of ex-service men over the body as it is taken to the church. Six men from the Arlington here will escort the body to Arlington.

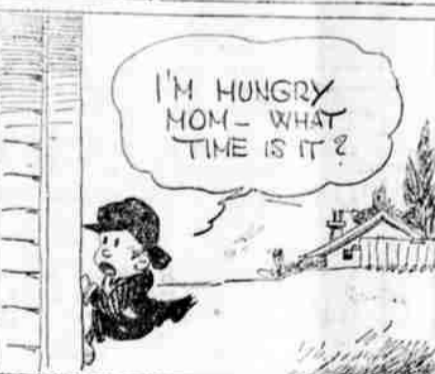
