3rd Sensational Indictment Is On Prohi Subaltern

Klamath's third sensational grand jury indictment will affect a state prohibition officer, and will have no bearing on the other two indictments returned. It became known last night.

The specific charge and details surrounding it are necessarily withheld, as well as the man's name, until his apprehension which is expected some time today.

It is understood that warrants have been issued for the apprehension of the state prohibition officer indicted.

E. L. Elliott, who will assume office tomorrow as district attorney of Klamath county, through his attorneys yesterday filed an affidavit of prejudice against Judge A. L. Leavitt. A move to have the indictment quashed failed and Elliott is withholding plea until arraignment before a new judge.

The following statement was issued by Elliott yesterday:

"In connection with the indictment returned against me I do not care to make any detailed statement at this time. The whole truth and all the facts will be fully disclosed in court at a later date. I wish to thank both of the Klamath Falls papers for the fair treatment they have given this matter, and I appreciate their attitude of unbiased fairness toward me. All I ask in this case is American fair play. I expect to be fully vindicated before this case is finished."

Klamath Pure Milk Campaign Bringing About Big Results

The campaign against dairymen with herds untested for tuberculosis has begun to have its effects, the county agent's office announced yesterday afternoon.

As a result of Dr. E. B. Lamb's announced intention to prosecute delinquent dairymen, seven milk dealers applied for tuberculin inspections yesterday.

The applications came from J. W. Heller, Mrs. Nancy Cantrell, W. C. Burke, Harvey Putman and Bert Bell, all of Shippington, and Fred Peterson and E. A. Higham of Klamath Falls.

Following is the itinerary of Dr. George D. Bishop, who will make tuberculin tests in this vicinity next week. Dairymen expecting tests must apply at once to C. A. Henderson's office in the court house, according to authorities who are handling the tuberculin tests in Klamath county. Dr. Bishop's itinerary:

Monday, Aug. 3: Fort Klamath in the morning; Algoma in the afternoon.

Tuesday, Aug. 4: Klamath Falls and the west side of the Upper lake in the morning; Pelican City and Shippington in the afternoon.

Wednesday, Aug. 5: Midland in the morning; west of the Klamath Falls-Merrill road in the afternoon.

Qualtz Valley Section Of K. F.-Lakeview Highway To Be Graded Early In Spring

PORTLAND, July 30.—(United News)—The Qualtz valley section of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway will receive attention from the state highway commission one year sooner than was expected. The commission has decided to have the right of way cleared and grubbed this fall and winter so it can be graded next spring. Frank Lovelless and S. P. Chandler donated to the state a tract nearly two acres for a park on Lakeview highway on Crooked creek, 14 miles north of Lakeview. The gift was accepted by the commission.

KLAMATH TRUSTY MAKES GETAWAY FROM STATE PEN

D. Jackson, Convicted For Forgery And Scheduled For Parole In Few Weeks Makes Getaway With Pal

SALEM, July 30.—(United News)—Philip Davis and D. Jackson, trusty convicts, made their escape from the state prison farm Thursday afternoon. The men were members of a gang employed in hoeing potatoes. They received permission to go to the creek for a drink and failed to return.

Davis was sent up from Walla-walla county, May 28, 1922, for a term not to exceed seven years, for larceny. Jackson was sent up from Klamath county December 8, 1924, for a term of two years for forgery. Both were eligible for parole in a few weeks.

A corps of prison guards have been relieved of duty at the prison yards to scour the surrounding country in search of the two escaped convicts. Sheriffs of surrounding counties have been notified to intercept the pair.

TURNER GETS 18 MONTHS

G. E. Turner, who pleaded guilty to a charge of obtaining goods under false pretences yesterday, was sentenced to 18 months in the state penitentiary by Circuit Judge Leavitt. Turner will be taken to Salem in a day or two, probably in custody of Deputy Lon Burke.

Last Rites For Silver Tongued Orator Today

SALEM, July 30.—Suspension of all business and social activities throughout Oregon between 3 and 4 o'clock Friday afternoon, during the funeral of William Jennings Bryan in Washington, D. C., is urged by Governor Pierce in a proclamation issued this afternoon.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—(United News)—Through the streets of the capital be loved, William J. Bryan will pass for the last time Friday, up to a wind-swept knoll of Arlington, overlooking the city of his shattered dreams.

Shattered Dream City

He returned a conqueror in death Thursday to the place which had known him in his highest official position, as secretary of state. Thousands who had watched his tumultuous public career, stood silently as his body was borne through the station early Thursday morning.

Other thousands beat a muffled last tattoo from noon until late at night as they stepped quietly past the bier in the church of the presidents here, where the great commoner lay in state.

The casket, with a flower lying on or near it, stood directly in front of the church altar. An American flag was at the right of the platform. Two more were draped over the casket. One was placed there at the request of Mrs. Ruth Bryan, Owen Bryan's daughter, and arranged by her own hands.

VETS OF FOREIGN WARS POST HERE OBTAINS CHARTER

Weary Willies—Can
They Come Back?
Here's One Who Did

"They can't come back" is what they say about those weary Willies, those ragged strangers, who decorate the reading rooms of the Salvation Army, repose in a "free flop" bed nightly, and panhandle the social organizations' headquarters for a free meal.

They don't come back—some of them. And again, some of them do. Here's the story of one who did come back to manhood.

Captain Hopper of the local Salvation Army headquarters here yesterday received a letter forwarded from Livingston, Mont., his former headquarters, and here's what the letter said:

"Enclosed please find \$5 to cover the \$3.50 you loaned me when I was down and out at Livingston in 1913. It has taken me 12 years to come back, but I have finally conquered liquor, got me a little farm down here in Rock Springs, (Wyo.) and am cheerfully refunding the money you gave me when I really was in need." The letter was signed by Charles Anderson, of Rock Springs.

'Oregon Heel' To Be Clamped on K. F. Boy Transported To Pen

The "Oregon heel" and a lead chain will be used by Deputy Sheriff Lon Burke in transporting G. E. Turner, to the Salem penitentiary today, to serve a two-year term, following a plea of guilty to a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses.

Information from the jail is that Turner will try to make his escape while being transported. The "Oregon heel" is a steel device with a heavy weight attached, which is clamped on the sole of a prisoner's shoe. In case a prisoner should overcome an officer, the weight prevents him from running at any great speed. Burke, who will leave with Turner this afternoon, will remain awake during the night, and until his prisoner is safely delivered.

Earth Tremors Felt In Southern Areas

KANSAS CITY, July 30.—(United News)—A series of earth tremors were felt in Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas Thursday, according to reports reaching here.

In Liberal Kan., windows in homes were rattled, but little damage was done. The shake lasted for 15 minutes at Medicine Lodge, Kan., it was said.

Two distinct shocks were felt in the panhandle section of Texas, the first beginning at 6 a. m. Chickasha, Okla., residents reported a slight tremor at 6 a. m.

So far as could be learned no one was injured. It was the southwest's first experience with a temblor.

Placing Terminal Here Contingent on I. C.

C. Granting Extensions Applied For, and Upon Whether Destructive To S. P. Competition Enters Field; K. F. Assured of Being on Main East-West Line.

The Southern Pacific terminal will be located in or on the outskirts of Klamath Falls. This was the official announcement of Paul Shoup, executive vice president of the Southern Pacific, in a letter to the chamber of commerce last night.

The location of the shops here is contingent upon the approval by the interstate commerce commission of the Southern Pacific's various requests for extensions, such as the Klamath Falls-Lakeview road and the Modoc Northern. It is also contingent upon whether destructive competition is permitted to enter the field.

It is also stated emphatically that Klamath Falls will be on the main line of the through route from Ogden to the east via the Central Pacific, and not be left out of the main line picture through a cut-off at the Williamson river, north of here.

It would seem by the official announcement, coming as it does, from the executive vice president of the Southern Pacific, that Klamath Falls, after all, would be the terminal site, rather than Fuego, as frequently and spasmodically reported.

Shoup's Announcement
Following is the announcement of Mr. Shoup to the chamber of commerce:

"In response to requests that we clarify the situation with respect to our plans for the development of transportation facilities in Klamath Falls, southern Oregon and northern California generally, they have been matured to the extent that enables me to make the following statement on behalf of the Southern Pacific company, authoritatively—in making it comprehensive, statements heretofore published are to some extent reviewed therein:

No Switching Charges
"1. The Southern Pacific has acquired, subject to approval of the interstate commerce commission, an interest in the Strahorn railroad (the O. C. & E.) and application has been made to extend this road to a point on Williamson river, and also to Silver Lake, and eastward to Lakeview. The Southern Pacific has made application to the interstate commerce commission for authority to extend its line southward through the Malin and Merrill territory forty miles to Cornell. The Southern Pacific, which has acquired all the common stock of the N. C. O., subject to the approval of the interstate commerce commission, has agreed to broad-gauge the entire line into Lakeview.

Links With Central Pacific
"3. Through the applications made and such other applications as are necessary, the interstate commerce commission will be asked for authority to create a line through from Klamath Falls to connect with the Central Pacific, giving a route via Ogden that will be reasonably direct, and avoid the present longer haul through Weed; and upon approval of the commission we will promptly undertake the construction of this line and build it within the time set by the commission.

Our study of the territory to be served, construction costs, and oper-

ating conditions are not yet complete, but we will complete these investigations within a reasonable time, and upon their completion will announce the route to the east to be taken to connect with the Central Pacific.

K. F. On East-West Route
"4. We have been asked whether or not there is any prospect that a cut-off between the Natron line and the Strahorn line at Williamson river would be constructed in the event we took over the Strahorn line, thereby placing Klamath Falls off the direct through route from Ogden to the east via the Central Pacific. It has not at any time been given any consideration. In fact, the suggestion did not come from us, nor do we know who suggested such a route.

Terminal Here
"5. If our applications are approved we will locate our terminal for this district at Klamath Falls. This involves a very considerable payroll at Klamath Falls, which will be increased as our traffic grows. This terminal would be located within six or eight miles of the center of the city. We wish to get as close in as may be practicable, but it is impossible at this time to name a more specific location.

"All these plans and promises are as definite as we can make them just at this time and are, of course, predicated upon the assumption that our applications are approved by the commission, without destructive competition; and the support of Klamath Falls for our program is assumed.

To Develop K. F.
"Supplementing the foregoing statement of our work as planned, it will be noted that not only will Klamath Falls become a very considerable railroad center, but that through our lines will be able to reach substantially all of the markets of the United States for its products with direct service. Locally it will be connected with all its tributary regions where railway service can be justified. It will be on a main trunk line between north Pacific coast points and California. It will be on a through line between Portland and western Oregon and the east; this line will give direct service to the east for the Klamath region.

Future Is Bright
"With the very great natural resources of this region under development, direct railway service to markets, and the establishment of (Continued On Page Two)
