LIBRARY PLANS MEET APPROVAL

Basement Auditorium Part Of Plan; Many Rooms In Convenient Style

The new public library for Klamath Falls will be constructed in an L-shape and will contain a full basement and the first floor.

This was assured yesterday evening when the library committee of the city council and representatives of the Women's Library club approved plans submitted by Charles N. Coseboom, library architect.

The basement of the proposed building will contain a stage, an assembly hall seating 350 people, and a committee room.

Upstairs will be the adults' reading room, study room, reference room, children's reading room, story hour chamber, work room, stock room and librarian's room.

The building, approximately 80x50 feet, will face in a diagonal line drawn across the intersection of Fifth and Klamath avenue. There will be 20 foot frontage on Klamath avenue and 22 foot frontage on Fifth street.

The library committee of the council is composed of E. H. Baisiger, C. L. Roberts and F. H. Cofer.
