

Pershing Is Nations Must Arm, Advice of Admiral

July 30.—(United Press.)—Insofar as she is financially able, every nation must construct war craft to the limit allowed under the terms of the Washington agreement, Admiral Robert E. Coontz, commander of the visiting United States fleet, declared in an interview Wednesday.

"This is necessary unless nations left behind in the race for military supremacy are assured protection," the commander said.

Commenting on the fleet personnel manning the visiting vessels, Coontz declared that the United States sailors of today were more intellectual and of finer moral fibre than those he brought here in 1908.

There have been only ten cases of over-stayed liberty thus far among the 11,000 sailors here, Coontz said, while on the previous visit there were more than 100 such instances.

LET'S PLAY THE GAME FAIR, FELLOWS

[The following is from the pen of Peter S. Twitty of the Department of Fish and Game of Georgia, and was printed in pamphlet form for distribution among the sportsmen of that state. But the sentiment is such that it will be appreciated by the sportsmen of Oregon just as highly as it was by the good fellows of the sister state across the continent.—Ed.]

Every game has its rules, and every player who is a real sportsman abides by them. The referees and the umpires are put in the game first to warn the players of these rules, and then to enforce the regulations.

In football, no player can start out ahead of his teammates without being "offside." His entire team is

penalized when he tries to get away ahead of the referee's whistle, and if he breaks the rules too often he is sent to the side lines.

In baseball, the players all come in together and try into the field at the same time. If one man tries to take advantage of the others, he is either fined or ejected from the game. Sometimes he gets both.

In golf there are very strict rules, violations of which are regarded as discourtesies to the other players. The golfer who does not count his score directly is especially obnoxious and is soon ostracized.

In football, baseball, golf, tennis, and in all other games, the players must abide by the rules and keep "within bounds." If the violators of the rules are not caught and penalized they at least have the pangs of guilty consciences, and are unpopular with the fellows who do "tote fair."

Hunting and fishing are two of the greatest games in the world. Once the sport of kings, they now provide recreation and pleasure for rich and poor alike. There is nothing more fascinating than a journey through the fields with a good dog, or a day by a river or lake with a good rod and reel.

The game and fish laws are the rules for hunting and fishing. The state game and fish commissioner and the various game wardens are the referees and umpires.

The officials are not injected into the games as "killjoys" or interlopers. They are there to aid the honest-to-goodness sportsmen, who compose the vast majority of the hunters and fishermen. Their first duty is to make the rules plain, and then to see that these rules are lived up to.

All they ask is that you don't get "offside" by hunting a few days ahead of the open season, in an effort to get a start on the other fellows, or miscount your score, like the golfer does his strokes, and bag

more game than the legal limit. They don't want you to bait your fields, drawing all the game birds from adjoining farms, and slaughter the birds by the score, while the other fellow fails to get even a fair shot.

The game and fish department is not interested in any individual, in any community, in any county, or in any district. It is working for the sportsmen everywhere.

So let's be real sportsmen, fellows.
