

DICK KERR MAY COME BACK TO CHI WHITE SOX

CHICAGO, July 31.—(United News)—It is reported that Dick Kerr, the midge southpaw star, who severed himself from the White Sox payroll after the 1922 season, because he didn't like the size of his check, and became ineligible by playing with black-listed players, will be back with the team in August.

Kerr asked Commissioner Landis for reinstatement a year ago, and was put on probation until August 4. Kerr is a southpaw, and Manager Eddie Collins is anxious to get him, as the team is in need of a southpaw. In the famous "fixed" world series of 1919 Kerr took the only two games won by the Sox from Cincinnati, pitching two shut-out victories, and endearing himself to fans for all time.

McGinnity carried on as a bush league pitcher, maintaining a better average than most juveniles less than half his age until this season.

SEATTLE, July 31.—(United News)—Johnny Weismuller smashed his own world's record of 52 seconds for the 100 yard swim in an exhibition race with Reginald Harrison, finishing the 100 yards in 50.4 seconds at the Lake Washington canal national A. A. U. tourney Friday afternoon.

He would have done even better, but caught his arm on one of the lead-ropes during the dash. He beat Harrison by 10 yards.

Weismuller's new world's record will be accepted, according to J. Farris, of Seattle, president of the northwest branch of the A. A. U. and national vice president of the parent organization. He was on the official's float during Weismuller's sensational race.

The Reds, who are beginning to

become a menace, won their seventh straight victory by bunting a few good hits, and defeating the Braves 4 to 3. Centerfielder Roush, aside from scoring the winning run, thwarted two or three runs in the second inning, by another of his bare-handed catches near the centerfield fence.

Cincinnati now has won 12 of its last 14 games, and stands five and a half games behind the Giants. The Dodgers defeated the Cards, 9 to 4, at St. Louis.

In the only game played, the Red Sox stopped the sensational scoring streak of the Indians, defeating them 7 to 2. The Indians had won six consecutive struggles and had piled up 44 scores during the half a dozen games.
