

LOCAL PHONE CO. ANNOUNCES NEW STOCK SELLING

Inauguration of the American Telephone and Telegraph company plan for the purchase of company stock on partial payment arrangements was made effective in Klamath Falls Saturday through an office authorized by the State Corporation Commissioner. F. R. Dunn, local manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company announced the new plan today.

The local telephone office will be a branch of the Bell Telephone Securities company, which was formed several years ago to pioneer the

direct sales and partial payment plan.

Every employee of the Telephone company will be a salesman for the Securities company and will take applications for purchase of the stock on either a cash or partial payment basis. Since a separate sales force will not be maintained there will be no added cost in operating the thrift plan.

Prior to extension of this arrangement to Oregon, purchasers of A. T. & T. stock had been forced to make direct purchases through brokers.

Dunn announced that the partial payment option provided for drafting of contracts providing for payment of \$10 per share per month. Interest of six per cent on all partial payments will be allowed and in the event a purchaser desires to cancel his agreement, his money will be returned plus four per cent.

"The stock purchased is not new or treasury stock," said Dunn, "but is stock that has been issued and

listed on the New York stock exchange and is bought for purchasers through brokers who are members of the exchange.

"Employees of the company are offering free the facilities of their organization to assist investors in obtaining A. T. & T. stock either by cash or monthly payments. The American Telephone Company has pioneered in this plan and during the past several years has placed more than 1,000,000 shares of stock with more than 135,000 individuals."

CENTRAL OREGON WILL HAVE BEST CROPS SINCE 1916, IS FORECAST

BEND, July 31.—Wheat growers of Jefferson county and agriculturists of the Deschutes country are harvesting their best crops since 1916, with the general opinion that the wheat stand in the Madras country this year is even better than that of 1916, according to information obtained today from county agents, bankers and farmers of the mid-state territory.

The yield of wheat in Jefferson county, the territory proposed to be watered by the North Unit project is from 12 to 20 bushels to the acre, compared with six or eight bushels to the acre in 1924. Although no definite information relative to the average yield can be obtained by comparing this year's crop with that of last year, because of the 1924 drought, it is estimated that the Jefferson wheat crop of 1925 is considerably above the average.

Although the Jefferson farmers are harvesting a heavy yield of wheat, the acreage planted this year is not so great as that of last year, and is far below the acreage of 1916. The difference between the 1916 and the 1925 acreage is attributable to the fact that there are approximately 1,000 less farmers in the North Unit territory this

season than nine years ago. Winter kill necessitated the reseeded of several fields in the Madras country this spring.

A greater acreage has been planted to grain crops in Deschutes county than in a number of years, according to W. T. McDonald, Deschutes county agent. This increase of acreage is attributable to the desire of farmers to raise their own seed. Instead of having it shipped in, paying a high price, McDonald explains. The grain crops in Deschutes county are unusually good. There was virtually no winter kill in this county. Much of the Deschutes grain was planted in the spring. Barley and wheat are now being harvested in Jefferson county.

Alfalfa, for which the Deschutes county is noted, this year has yielded a greater tonnage to the acre than in a number of years, according to estimates made by farmers who have put up their first crops. Cutting of second crops is under way in parts of Deschutes county, and it is believed that this crop will also be greater than similar crops of former years. The work of harvesting the first crops has been virtually completed in all parts of the county. Alfalfa is growing very rapidly.
