Liquor and Traffic Violations Swamp Police Judge Lem

Gaghagen Puts No Quarter
Flag Out For Drivers
While Intoxicated

Police Judge Gaghagen spent the busiest morning in police court since the Fourth of July festivities, when sixteen persons appeared before him to answer for traffic and liquor violations.

A. C. Hallman was committed to jail for ten days when he failed to pay a \$20 fine imposed for drunkenness.

R. C. Anderson, arraigned on a charge of intoxication, was fined \$25. He made an initial deposit of \$19.82 and agreed to "pay like rent" before the fifteenth of the month.

John Hart was committed to jail for a ten-day stretch, when he was unable to pay a \$20 fine for drunkenness.

Judge Gaghagen was true to his promise. The judge a short time ago declared motorists who drove while intoxicated would receive no mercy. Walter Hill was fined \$100 for driving while drunk.

V. B. Torry paid a \$20 fine for indulging in the luxury of a plain drunk.

Everett Owings was fined \$3 for driving without a muffler.

Charles Rase paid \$2 for parking across an alley entrance.

A fine of \$2 was imposed upon B. K. Ringle for driving without a tail light.

N. Z. Manns was fined \$5 for speeding.

J. D. Price was fined \$2 for driving without lights.

A fine of \$1 was paid by a motorist who parked too close to an intersection, and a similar penalty was paid by O. Peyton for parking in the fire zone.

H. N. Ripper paid a two-dollar fine for driving without a tail light.

Three other motorists, guilty of parking violations, did not appear.

KLAMATH COUNTY FOURTH IN STATE FOR AVERAGE BUTTERFAT RATING

Klamath county held fourth place in the list of Oregon associations which submitted to tests in the average pounds of milk and butter fat, according to an exhibition report received last night from the department of agriculture of Oregon Agricultural college.

The associations rated were Tillamook, Lincoln, Union, Klamath, Melrose, Coquille and Columbia, the latter not reporting. Testers in charge were: Tillamook, R. S. Hall; Klamath, C. A. Henderson; Lincoln, J. R. Beck; Union, R. E. Emmel; Melrose, Fred Knowl; Coquille, C. R. Richards.

The report will be of valuable information to the Klamath dairy ranchers, who are endeavoring to bring up their standard in the association. In the Klamath report, 71 cows were listed, with the average pounds of milk at 753. Average pounds of fat was placed at 25.82. Number of 40 pounds cows reached seven.

C. W. Lewis, rancher on the Merrill road, submitted 24 cows for test, their milk averaging 340 pounds, with an average fat weight of 30.82. The Lewis herd rated the highest average fat in production of those interested in the Klamath association tests.

HENRY STILES IS ELECTROCUTED BY HIGH VOLT WIRE

Funeral services for Henry Stiles, 22, 2611 Eberlein street, who was instantly killed by a high voltage power line at Lake Ewauna Sunday afternoon, will be held at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday morning. Rev. A. F. Simmons will direct the ceremonies.

Stiles is survived by a widow and three minor children.

Death is believed to have been caused by contact with an iron runway against which, a strong wind had blown the wire carrying a load of 11,000 volts.

Stiles fell backward into the water and was dead when recovered a short time later. So sudden and so potent was the shock that Stiles uttered no cry of distress.

As all evidence indicated an accidental death, an inquest was deemed unnecessary.

Stiles was employed with a pile-driving crew for the Sawmill Engineering and Construction company. F. Hill Hunter, general manager of that concern, witnessed the accident.

PIONEER RANCHER OF KLAMATH DIES

Jesse H. McFall, 69, one of the oldest and most respected ranchers of Poe valley, passed away late Saturday following a stroke of paralysis. Mr. McFall came to Oregon when he was but 18 years old. The trip from the middlewest was made in an emigrant train.

Mr. McFall was born in Springfield, Mo., April 6, 1856. When only 9 years old he attempted to get into the Civil war as a drummer boy, but was turned down because of his tender age. He had lived in the Klamath country for nearly 20 years. He married Mary Roberts in 1877 and had two children by her, John and Pearl, both of whom are still living. Mrs. McFall died while the children were in infancy.

Buried Yesterday
In 1892 Mr. McFall married Alice Wymer. Their four children, Earl Clarence, Lottie and Wilma as well as a two step-children, Ethel Roberts and Hurley Finton are still living. Mr. McFall is also survived by two brothers, Harf and Russell, who live in Missouri.
