

NDONS LOG IN MID-STREAM RIVER; ATTEMPTS ESCAPE CURRENT ALONE, BUT FAILS

Told By Brother Who Attempted Rescue In
Narrowly Escapes Drowning Himself
In Weeds

Alward apparently maintained his presence of mind to the end, for his sister saw him take a deep breath of air six or eight times, as he reappeared on the surface. At last, he disappeared and did not return to the surface.

Norris, alarmed by the predicament of his brother-in-law, attempted to rush to his rescue. He abandoned the log on which he was coasting, and tried to make the shore in order to run down the bank to Alward's assistance. A thick network of weeds near shore, however, tangled their tendrils about him, and if Norris had not seized a log held in the weeds, he too, would probably have drowned.

Many Aid Rescue

The entire logging camp aided in the rescue. A block was placed half a mile down the river to prevent the body from floating further downstream, but recovery was made only a few feet from the scene of Alward's disappearance.

"Jack," a skilled French Canadian logger, rescued the body from the river. Hiding a log down the deep channel in the stream, "Jack" sounded the depths with a pole, and fished it up from the rocks on which it caught.

Alward is survived by a sister, Mrs. Floyd Norris of Klamath Falls, a mother and brother in Denver, and a sister living in Michigan.

He was spending a two months' vacation from his position in Denver as foreman of the Colorado Iron works, with his sister and brother-in-law. He and his brother-in-law came to Klamath Falls a few days ago and obtained work with the Peyton Logging company Thursday. They started to work Friday and worked together till Saturday noon.

Alward intended to work only a short time here in Klamath Falls, and planned to return to Denver within the next two weeks.

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A Tan and Camel Polo Pull-On Sweater



HOW TO KNIT A TURTLE NECK SWEATER

Every woman knows she wants and needs must have a turtle neck sweater, if she is to be smartly dressed. No sweater style has proved so popular in years. The turtle neck is chic, smart, distinctive, and becoming to most women worn under the tailored suit, the coat, or with a sport shirt. Worn with the popular choker beads the polo pullover, as the English call this garment, is indeed attractive. It is also practical and warm and easy to knit of soft, light weight yarns. It is as popular for men as for women and promises to be a college vogue this coming season.

It takes three balls of sky blue and one ball of camel of lustrous Iceland yarn to make this model.

DIRECTIONS FOR SIZE 38
Needles—1 pair Double Pointed No. 5.
Crochet Hook No. 4
11 Stitches—2 inches
7 Rows—1 inch
With blue, cast on 35 stitches. Work 12 stockinette stitch (knit 1 row, purl 1 row) for 20 rows. Join "camel" yarn 1 row, with blue, work 2 rows, 1 row camel, 2 rows blue, 1 row camel, 2 rows blue. Repeat between "s" until work measures 18 inches. There should be 7 patterns. On second row of 1st pattern, bind off 7 stitches each side and decrease 1 stitch each side every 2nd row 5 times. Then when there are 13 rows of 1st pattern, work 20 stitches for shoulder. On these 20 stitches, complete pattern, work 2 camel stripes and 2 rows of blue. Place these 20 stitches on a holder, place centre 34 stitches on another holder for back of neck. On remaining 20 stitches work same as 1st shoulder. Join, casting on 34 stitches at centre front. Work front same as back beginning to increase for armhole on 6th blue row of 2nd pattern from neck. Bind off.

COLLAR—On front, with blue, pick up and knit 44 stitches, from centre shoulder to centre of other shoulder. Knit 2, purl 2, across row and repeat for 3 inches. Repeat for back of neck, taking stitches from holder, and picking up 4 stitches each side.

Place all stitches on 1 needle, knit 1 row to form ridge, on wrong side of sweater then work in stockinette stitch for a turn down collar 2 1/2 inches. Fasten off. Join camel work 4 rows. Bind off. Sew seam. With camel, work 1 row of single crochet on collar.

SLEEVES—With blue, pick up and knit 30 stitches around armhole. Work 10 rows, decreasing 1 stitch each side every 2nd row 5 times. Then decrease 1 stitch every 7th row 15 times. 54 stitches, there will be 4 sets of camel stripes. With blue, on knit row, knit 2nd and 3rd stitches together, then every 4th and 5th stitches together across row.

Work 2 inches. Fasten off. Join camel, work 4 rows. Bind off. Sew seams, making an inch turn at wrist edge and 1/4 inch hem at end of sleeves, French.
