PARALLEL PARKING—AND WIDER STREETS

Time: 9 p. m. Saturday night.

Place: Main business district, Klamath Falls.

Every inch of available parking space from Third to Tenth on both Main and Klamath occupied, with room to spare on Pine.

Cars jogging along like snails (necessarily) single file (necessarily). Driver of car parked obliquely waiting, in vain, for a chance to get out. He finally does get out in the middle of the street, but bing! His rear fender and somebody else's front fender wend their way to a garage for repairs. All along Main street can be heard: "Ye, Gods! Klamath Falls people and tourists joined in the single thought—it's a situation which should be remedied. It is, and it will continue to be, until parallel parking is put into effect.

And with the coming growth of the city, how long will parallel parking stem the tide? That is another thing to think about, and now, for the big leap is not far in the offing. The only measure left will be a no parking restriction in any business section of the city. Property cannot reach its full value without wider streets and a consequent wider flow of traffic.

It would involve a huge expense to widen the streets of the business district of Klamath Falls. It would stagger some. But, if it is to be done, now is the time to start some quick thinking followed by some quick action. Better to do it now than wait until the big buildings, built for permanency, arrive, and then sit around and weep because it cannot be done.

Back in the middlewest, Des Moines, Iowa, was confronted with self-same question when industrial growth hit it, like it is bound to hit Klamath Falls. Des Moines sat tight. It waited, waited—now Des Moines is a city of 130,000 and is sadly lamenting its narrow, congested streets. One hundred miles west of Des Moines, is Omaha. When rail development came to Omaha, the eastern terminus of the Union Pacific, Omaha changed its streets, at what seemed to a town of 15,000, a staggering expense. Today Omaha has no serious traffic problem. They are parking on both sides of the streets and in the middle of the street, with two wide avenues of car space. And last week's issue of the American Legion is broadcasting to the world the beautiful wide streets of Omaha, where the Legion's national convention will be held this year.

Montgomery street, San Francisco, failed to widen its streets after the earthquake laid it in ruins. And today property owners on that street are lamenting that their property would be worth 50 per cent more if they had used forethought.

This city needs a city planning commission, to make an exhaustive study of the question. Now is the time, not five or 10 years from now.

TODAY'S RECIPES

Fricassee of Dried Beef—One cup dried beef, finely chopped, one tablespoon butter, two eggs, one-half pint (one cup) milk. Melt butter in milk, add beef. Cook five minutes, then put in beaten eggs slowly. Stir until sauce is thick. Serve on toast.

Popovers—Two eggs, one cup of milk, one tablespoon shortening, one cup sifted pastry flour, one-half teaspoon salt. Beat eggs until light and thick. Add milk and beat into dry ingredients gradually to avoid lumping. Bake in a hot oven 20 to 30 minutes.

Italian Beets—In cooking the Italian beets have ready six medium sized beets that have been cooked until tender in boiling water, then plunged in cold water and peeled. Cut each beet into about eight pieces and pour over the following sauce: Cream four tablespoons of butter or oleo, blend with two tablespoons of flour and pour on slowly two cups of strained vegetable stock. Cook, stirring constantly, until the mixture boils and add salt and paprika to taste, one-half teaspoon of sugar.

STEP-WORD PUZZLE

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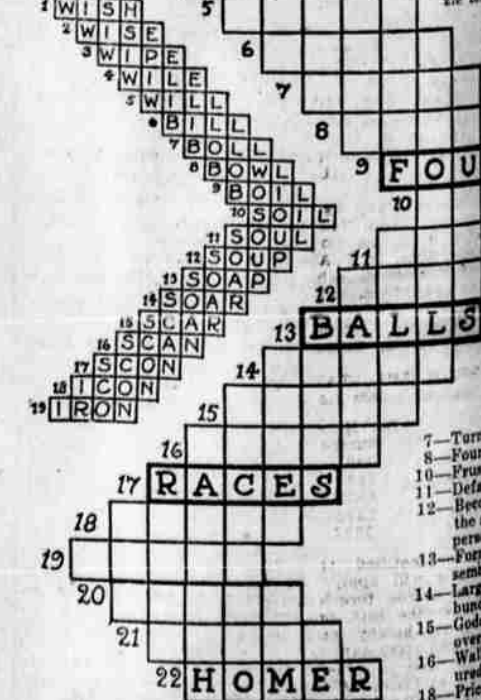
