

Pelicans Smash Out Victory By Terrific 9th Inning Rampage

PELICANS GAME TO LAST, DESPITE BIG LEAD HUNG UP BY MT. SHASTA

Arnold And Bayness Get Homers, Arnold's Long Wallop Driving In Winning Runs; Lefty Mohler Pitches Creditable Game But Gives Way To Street In 7th; Pelicans In Striking Distance Of Top

Smothered under an 8 to 5 lead, with Mt. Shasta on the long end of the score, the Pelicans, with a magnificent batting rally in the ninth frame, scored five runs, and with it a 10 to 8 victory Sunday, down at the foothills of Shasta. The spirit that has characterized the Klamath Falls club throughout the season—that of "never say die" was put to the acid test in that glorious inning, and the Pelicans won the game that put them in undisputed position next to the league-leading Weeds, and kept them within the striking distance of only one game of tying that well-nigh invincible team of slugging and fielding fools.

Before that memorable ninth, the ball game wasn't worth a nickel—insofar as the Pelican chances for victory were concerned.

That Mount Shasta club doesn't belong in the cellar. They are a team that has been playing in hard luck from the start of the season. Losing the first game to the Pelicans 1-0 and the second 5-4 in 11 innings, the Shastas made Sunday's game no exception to the rule of the season—a hard uphill battle to the last out.

Southpaw Duel
Two southpaws were pitted against each other—and a pitcher's battle it was, until the ninth. The 10-8 score does not tell the tale. Errors helped to run up the count for both teams. Every batter was worked on by both Coolidge and Mohler, and let it be said right here, that they both worked like victors. Coolidge stalked his all in speed; Mohler relied on experience—and the corners.

The Pelicans started their scoring in the second inning, scoring three runs on 2 hits, errors by the Shastas helping the Pelicans along. In their half of the second, however, the Shastas came back and duplicated—scoring three runs on two hits and a free pass by Mohler.

Pelicans in Arrears
Things didn't remain evenly balanced until the ninth, when the Pelicans overwhelmed the Shastas. In the third the Shastas slipped across two runs, in the fourth they added another, and in the fifth yet another. Meanwhile, the Pelicans' only demonstration on the offensive was a home run over the fence by Mr. Bayness. Incidentally it was Bayness' first homer of the season. The kid has his batting eye, as evinced by the three hits he got during the game. But Coolidge was twirling a remarkable game. He fanned nine Pelicans—that's a lot more than any record hung up by other league pitchers against the Klamath team.

Mohler Retires
Mohler gave way in the last of 7th to Elmer Street, Mohler going into centerfield and O'Brien replacing Mickey Demitt, who received a painful elbow injury necessitating his retirement. But Mohler had been pitching a good game. His support was far from what it should have been. He kept his hits well scattered, and had struck out nine men in six innings.

Street, who hurled the last three innings, was invincible. The Mallin boy didn't give a semblance of a hit, and the only two men to get on, and they didn't get past the first sack, did it on a base on balls and an error respectively.

The Glorious Ninth
As aforesaid, the situation was anything but encouraging in the first of the ninth. But if there was a lump in the boys' throats, Freddie Glover soon quashed it by instilling the "can't be beat" spirit into his buddies. And this was the result: Mohler socked out a slashing two-bagger to the centerfield fence, the ball missing going over the fence by inches. Street, second man up, reached out after a wide one and smacked a Texas leaguer for a clean hit, Mohler scoring. The score was 8-6, with none out. Coolidge was weakening. Only an iron man, and few of them, could weather nine innings, pitching at that pace. Norwest cracked out a three-bagger that the fielders couldn't handle, and in Street came with the 7th tally. Watts went out, attempting to sacrifice. Mathews brought Norwest in for the tying run, on a fielder's choice. The Pelicans were breathing easier with the score tied, one down and Bert Arnold, the old reliable, stalking to the plate. The Shasta battery had Bert's number, and evidently wanted to walk him, like they had several times in earlier innings. Bert stood waiting there for one to come into the grove. It came. It

Their favorite home run field, the Cubs' park, is to be altered until a home run will mean something. President William Veeck of the Cubs announced Monday, that the work of removing a portion of the left field bleachers would start Tuesday.

In the National the Pirates oft and unexpectedly defeated by the Phillies this season, asserted themselves against Art Fletcher's nondescript and quelled them twice in one afternoon, both times by the score of 3 to 2. Inasmuch as the Giants muffed another game in St. Louis, 7 to 6, the Giants wound up one and a half games abait the Piratical stern.

In the American the Athletics beat the White Sox, 3 to 2, while the Tigers were beating the Senators by the same score. This combination of events expanded the Athletics' lead to two full games.

Reverting to the National league situation the Reds lost a chance to land within driving distance of the Giants, when they lost to the Braves, 3 to 1. Garry Herrmann's landwehr is still five games back of the Giants but still in third spot. The Dodgers lost to the Cubs, 7 to 4, so altogether it was a day of jubilation for the second division teams in the jubilee league, the Phillies being the only losers in the lower register.

And now to polish off the account of the day's events in the American league the Yanks whipped the Indians, 3 to 2, making five games out of nine on the day's major league program that were decided by that score, and the Browns won one from the Red Sox, 12 to 4.

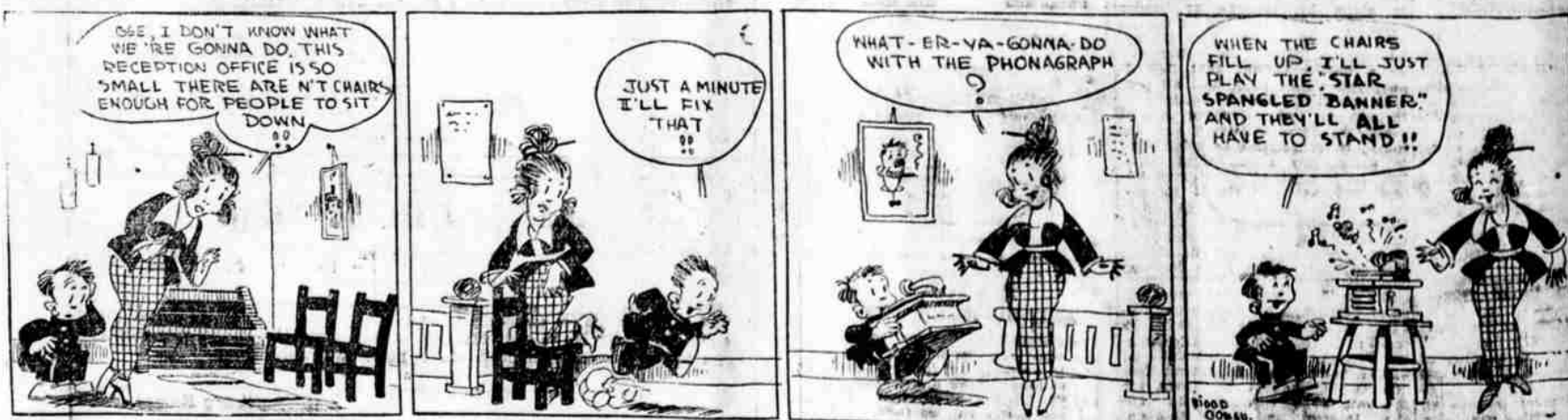
