

# COPCO PROTECTS AGAINST FIRES

Improvements under way by the California Oregon Power company have been recognized as one of the most advantageous advances within the city in regard to the lessening of fire hazards in that section of the city now being paved.

Prior to the final laying of this pavement, the company has laid six inch pipe from Eleventh and Klamath down Eleventh to Oak street, and from Oak to Fourth streets.

Leading up Fourth street to Walnut makes a length of six-inch pipe 18 blocks in length, protecting that section of the city from fire hazards never before protected. Another section four blocks in length on Walnut street is made with four inch pipes.

These pipes are taking the place of smaller pipes in the water system marking off an improved district in the city. This protection will affect all of the district from Klamath to Broad streets, improving fire prevention 100 per cent.

Between Fourth and Eleventh streets on Oak and Walnut streets, all power lines are being moved from the streets to the alleys, as is the ultimate plan of all lines throughout the city.

# Boy Scouts Abandon Camp After Outing

# FRENCH PLAN OFFENSIVE ON NIGH IMPREGNABLE RIFFIAN FORTRESS

FEZ, French Morocco, Aug. 4.—(United News)—Towering 300 feet above the sizzling plain, a 17th century fortress whence Abd-el-Krim's Riffians descend to raid and murder has been discovered by French troops.

This picturesque lair is midway between Fez and Ouezzan. It was built by the Portuguese in the 17th century before the tiny country had been eliminated as a great colonial power. Its thick walls are in a wonderful state of preservation. The interior forms a virtually impregnable fortress about 300 feet by 600 feet in dimension. Encircling this inner citadel are three moated walls, each pierced by gates and equipped with drawbridges. As many as 800 Riffians have been sheltered there at one time in preparation for raids on the country side.

Small artillery would be useless against the massive fortress, and to take it by assault would be a very costly operation.

In the region of this old stronghold the French are operating armored tanks, the most modern implement of war. Thus old and the new in warfare are meeting on the African plains.

Krim's Riffians had their first taste of really modern warfare Sunday when half a dozen tanks hunched and puffed over the irregular terrain to plow through villages in the vicinity of Azjem, five miles northwest of Ouezzan. The operation was undertaken in order to rid the area of marauders who had been unusually active recently.

Because of the nature of the terrain woods, ravines and caverns—artillery bombardment was insufficient to dislodge the Riffians. Infantry and cavalry outfits followed the tanks to mop up.

It must have been very much like hell riding in those careening iron-clads under a sun that kept the air smoky with 150 degrees

of heat. In the shade the thermometer was lower, but the tanks could not pick shady paths. The crews of the tanks suffered tremendously but they stubbornly continued firing point blank at the surprised Riffians for hours as their mounts lumbered on. The metal sheaths were scorching hot and the interior of the tanks might have served as a slow oven. The Riffians finally fled, abandoning their dead.

The natives were in the midst of a three day celebration of the birthday of the prophet when the tanks appeared. It was the occasion of the musliman new year. They were astounded by the queer crawling foris, which spat a thundering exhaust from one end and deadly bullets from all sides.

This includes the county taxes and a portion of the city taxes omitting the sewer taxes and city paving levies.
