 "Accordingly, while our actions are in no wise free, every man's individual character is to be regarded as a free act. He is such and such a man, because once for all it is his will to be that man."  
 Schopenhauer, explaining this attitude, observed that the will itself, and in itself, and also in so far as it is manifest in an individual (and accordingly constitutes the individual and fundamental desires of that individual) is independent of all knowledge, because it is antecedent to such knowledge.  
 "All that it receives from knowledge is the series of motives by which it successively develops its nature and makes itself cognizable or visible; but the will itself, as something that lies beyond time,

and so long as it exists at all, never changes."

Therefore, this school of thought teaches, every man, being what he is and placed in the circumstances which for the moment obtain, but which on their part also arise by strict necessity, can absolutely never do anything else than just what at that moment he does do.  
 Accordingly, the whole course of a man's life, in all its incidents great and small, is as necessarily predetermined as the course of a clock.

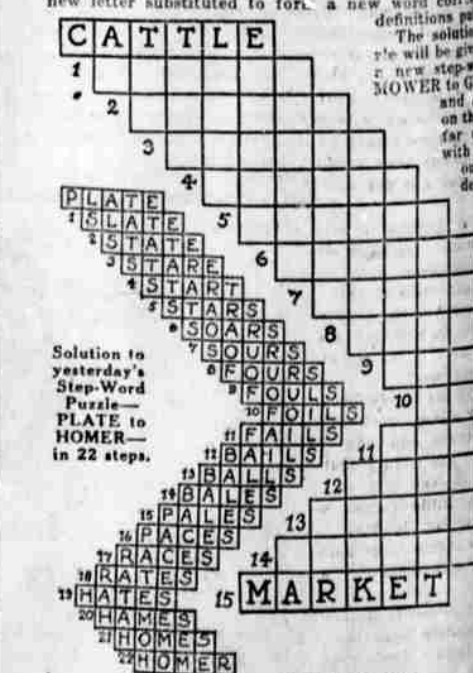
