

PATRIOTIC SPIRIT SHOWN BY WOMEN OF FT. KLAMATH IN ORPHANS' DRIVE

Community Club Women Raise \$356 Toward Aiding Legion Endowment Drive; Go Way Over Top

(Special To The News)
FORT KLAMATH, Aug. 5.—The Fort Klamath Women's Community club, the Chiloquin Woman's Community club and the Klamath Agency Woman's club wish to announce that the net proceeds from the benefit dance at Fort Klamath given on July 18, are \$356. The expenses were small but the amount taken in far exceeded the expectations of those who planned the affair.

Needless to say, the ladies of these organizations are greatly pleased over the results and are deeply grateful to the people who contributed to the success of the enterprise. Part of the proceeds has been given to the American Legion endowment fund for disabled veterans and orphans of the world war. The remainder is being subscribed to the Doernbecker children's hospital fund, the amount given now to be applied on a subscription of \$500 which will endow a bed in that hospital in perpetuity. The rest of the money needed to complete this subscription will be raised by the three clubs, as individual organizations, the money to be pooled finally and the names of

the three clubs to be inscribed on the corner stone in the endowed room at the hospital. This hospital is being built in Portland with funds from the Doernbecker estate, and equipped and endowed by funds collected from other sources. The Oregon State Federation of Women's clubs has guaranteed \$20,000 toward the latter fund and it is through this channel that the three women's clubs are sending their subscription.

The Doernbecker hospital will fill a crying need in Oregon for a special hospital for children of a general nature. Its worth will in no way overlap that of the Shriner's hospital for crippled children, as the latter does not take general cases, nor children over 14, confining its work to crippled children of sound mind and to those ailments which it can help. Because of the easily recognized worthiness of the cause, the women of the three clubs undertaking to fulfill their pledge, take great pleasure in doing so, and urge upon interested individuals and other organizations to cooperate in the equipping and maintenance of this splendid institution.

VARIED ASSORTMENT OF RABBITS WILL BE KLAMATH FAIR FEATURE

A. R. Renner, superintendent of the rabbit division at the county fair, reported today that entries comprising New Zealand Reds, Himalayas, Chinchilla, Flemish and Blue Giants as well as a large entry of utility rabbits, had been promised him. Mr. Renner will display some of his imported Blue Giants and American Blues, but these will, of course, owing to the fact that Mr. Renner will judge the rabbits, not compete with others. Special built collapsible cages have been ordered by the fair board for the fair and will be on hand when the new building for poultry and rabbits is completed.

Great local interest has been awakened in rabbit raising and the opportunities for back-yard profits as well as proportionately larger ones for those ranches that can afford the space for a few well-constructed rabbit hutches, is unlimited. The demand for rabbits from agrarians and markets will increase proportionately to the uni-

formity of production. Some of the boys and girls in club work will also have exhibits in this division.

Mrs. J. Fred Goeller has appointed Mesdames R. E. Wattenberg and Z. J. Powell as her assistants in the domestic art division at the county fair and from activities in the various sewing clubs, and organizations in town, it is anticipated that a larger entry in this ever popular department will be shown.

J. H. Hospital officials could give but meager reports as to the accident, with the exception that a falling saw struck the injured man in the head. He was reported out of danger, however, last night.

Richard Lamb, an employe of the California, Oregon Power company was brought to Klamath Falls Wednesday morning for medical attention suffering from a badly broken leg.

The accident occurred when Lamb was struck by a pole which fell from an upright position into which it was being lifted by fellow employes.

First shipment this month was made by W. C. Dalton of Malin, who sent 60 head of shorthorn calves to Oakland, the first shipment to be made south under the orderly marketing system now entered into with the California Cattle Growers' association.

Carl Wren of Dorris is shipping through Klamath Falls a carload of sheep to Dixon, California, Friday morning.

On August 19 D. Q. Adams will ship one carload of sheep to Yolo, and on the same day R. T. Correy is shipping three cars of sheep to San Francisco.
