He was convicted in Chicago of the alleged murder of a drug clerk in a holdup. He swears he is not guilty, and the governor of Illinois has received telegrams from one "Robert Scott," who says he is the guilty party, but "Robert Scott" has not appeared in person to save Russell Scott's life.

CONTRACT GIVEN FOR FAIR BLDG.

At a special meeting of the county fair board at 10 a. m. Thursday morning the contract for the erection of a poultry and pet stock pavilion was awarded to Cook & McCoy, contractors of this city, for the sum of \$1,945. This was on specifications calling for corrugated No. 26 steel roof, the building to be with wooden siding. Bids were also submitted by H. E. Schoetgen and Asher & Storey of this city.

The later firm bid only on erecting a wooden building with tar paper roof at \$949, while the former firm bid \$1,711.82 for corrugated iron structure (both roof and siding), from \$1,654.36 to \$1,658.36 on wooden building with various qualities of tar paper roofing, \$430.64 for labor only on the erection of a steel roofed and sided building and \$635.15 for labor only on wooden structure.

Proof for the racing program was reviewed and O. K'd.

Racing judges for the county fair were nominated: W. C. Dalton, Malin; Frank Grohs, Laugel valley and Lindley Sisemore, Fort Klamath; Seth Dixon, Fort Klamath, starter.

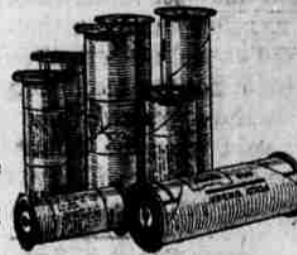
