

# OWENS VALLEY MEN SHOW GREAT INTEREST IN KLAMATH FARM LAND

## Henderson Back From Southern California After Successful Trip In Interests Of Development

"Farmers and ranchers of the Owens valley district are interested in Klamath county and southern Oregon, and their interest may lead to one of the most beneficial moves the county has ever made if the altitude now carried by the southern men is maintained," declared C. A. Henderson, county agriculturist, who returned from a three weeks' visit in Bishop and Owens valley, Thursday evening. Henderson was sent with funds supplied from the county court and the chamber of commerce, in order to influence ranchers of that section in giving Klamath county an inspection tour before purchasing land elsewhere.

While in the south Henderson had the opportunity to discuss the problems of the people with more than 200 ranchers, who had sold or were planning to sell out their lands to the city of Los Angeles, which is anxious to obtain the water rights of the valley.

"An interest has filled the valley residents in regard to the Klamath country," said Henderson yesterday, "and all have heard of the fertile southern Oregon country through literature or through those who made trips to that section during the caravan trips last spring."

According to Henderson, there is a sad touch about the whole affair, when realization is brought that the many splendid and expensive homes will be left to fall to pieces and the fertile lands turn back into the sage brush, from which they were converted with unending toil and hardships.

Many of the ranchers were born on the lands which they grow to cultivate and improve. A number of the elder pioneers of that section fought with the Plute-Indians, wrestled the land with effort indescribable and had hopes of a future of peace and contentment to enjoy the fruits of their labors.

As many as three-fourths of the farmers with whom Henderson came in contact, have expressed their plans of coming to Klamath Falls and using that as their base, work around the Klamath country, through Langell valley, and all through this section, in order to prove to themselves that the tales of the fertility of the lands are true, and that they have found an investment worth their money.

One of the biggest drawing cards used by Henderson, was the fact that nowhere on the coast was there as splendid hunting and fishing as there is in the Klamath country. The ranchers, who are of the out-of-doors type, lovers of sport, fairly beamed when Henderson discussed Tule lake geese hunting that Klamath sportsmen enjoy in the fall season.

"Ranchers are getting good money for their land from the city of Los Angeles," said Henderson, "and they are able to come north, invest in property, and still have money to tide them over for some time. There is no fear as to their failure, as they are men who have made it a life-time study and know every inch of the ranching and farming ropes."

2. That the applications necessary for standardization of the Nevada California Oregon railway be granted.
3. That the applications of the Oregon Trunk line or "Hill lines" to enter this territory, either by common user of the Southern Pacific, or by new construction, be denied, as not in the public interest.
