

Pelicans Battle Yreka Mystery Team At Fair Grounds To

PELICANS EXPECTED TO MAINTAIN FAST PACE SET IN LAST 3 GAMES

Street's Arm In Wonderful Condition While Pelican Sluggers are Out To Bust Up "Strikeout King" Jones

Record With A Score Of Hits

Spurred on by two straight victories, and realizing that while only one game behind Weed in the pennant chase, they must take every remaining game, as the Weeds are practically certain to do, the Klamath Pelicans will make a titanic attempt to overcome the jinx of Yreka by taking the last of the three-game series with that club this afternoon, after losing the first two contests in hectic games.

Street will occupy the mound for the Pelicans, with O'Brien, the new Pelican catcher, receiving him. That at any rate, is Glover's battery lineup at present.

Jones, who recently joined the Yreka club, coming from Grants Pass, will twirl for the opposing team. Jones has plenty on the ball. He whiffed 19 Pelican batters in an exhibition game here July 5. He lost his game, although it was due to miserable support given him by his Grants Pass team mates.

The league is looking with much interest upon the Yekans' performance this afternoon. They present a rejuvenated team—one might say mystery team—whose strength will not be quite known until they exhibit their wares on the fair grounds ball lot at 2:15 p. m.

Despite the mystery opposition, the Pelicans are doped as 2 to 1 favorites over the Californians. Street, who has won his last three games, pitching sensational ball in each instance, has shown no signs of weakening since his return from the hospital list.

Suffice it to say, the Pelicans realize that with a defeat this afternoon pennant hopes will be shattered, for if Weed wins, and thereby gets a two-game lead, that means a run, only by a miracle, he overcomes with the short end of the season left to play. The Pelicans have pennant aspirations—serious ones—and this afternoon promises to see some hectic ball—especially if the Yekans pile up a lead in the early innings, as has been their custom in previous games against the Klamath.

The game will be called at 2:15 sharp. It will be the last opportunity to see the Pelicans in action on the home grounds for three weeks, their next two games being at McCloud and Weed.

DAVE SHADE IS EASILY VICTOR OVER SCHOELL

RECREATION PARK, RINGSIDE, SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8. (United Press)—Dave Shade, welterweight runner up, outpointed Frankie Schoell in a close decision here tonight. Shade took five rounds and two were even. He was plainly the better of the two boys, chasing the Buffalo boy around the ring, knocking him down in the first round, and staggering him twice after that.

Shade got off to a good start by flooring the Buffalo boy with a hard right to the eye. Schoell only took the count of one, however, and rose to his feet and retreated while Shade chased him around the ring, Frankie using a left jab when the boys closed in.

In the second round Schoell continued to use the left jab to good advantage and took the round by a good margin. He also took the third round, using the jabbing tactics and kept dancing around Shade, while the latter kept following Frankie and came to a halt when the Buffalo boy slammed his left to the stomach, and cut Shade's eye with another left jab.

Frankie maintained his lead in the fourth by continuing to use his educated left. The fourth was even. As the fight progressed Shade began to get the range on fast moving Buffalo boy and began to work right and left to the head, and in the eighth and ninth he had Frankie dizzy. In the tenth Shade forced the fighting and gave Schoell a good lacing, the latter contenting himself by working his left jab in exchange for the Californian's numerous rights and lefts. Schoell made a running fight of it.

After Johnny Jones, Paul Strand, Rube Yarrison and half a dozen other Pacific Coast League players, purchased at exorbitant figures by the big leagues, proved bloomers in the big show a couple of years ago, the big league bosses announced that they were through paying fancy prices for inexperienced ball players.

That were the moguls really sincere? It is hard to hold to a decision like that and let some other club buy a new gate attraction from under your nose.

So, right now it looks as though the rubbers were coming off many big league bank rolls again. According to word from the Pacific coast the major leagues are bidding against one another for the services of Paul Waner, young outfielder of the San Francisco club. The bidding has now reached \$75,000, it is said, and is still going on.

The Cincinnati Reds, the New York Yankees, Chicago Cubs and one or two other clubs are in the bidding. If the present price is correct the Frisco club may well expect to peddle him for \$100,000.

One selling argument advanced by Frisco is Waner's slugging record. In the first 93 games Waner played this year he collected 150 hits. Of these 34 were doubles, five were triples and nine homers. This gave him a record of 221 total bases.

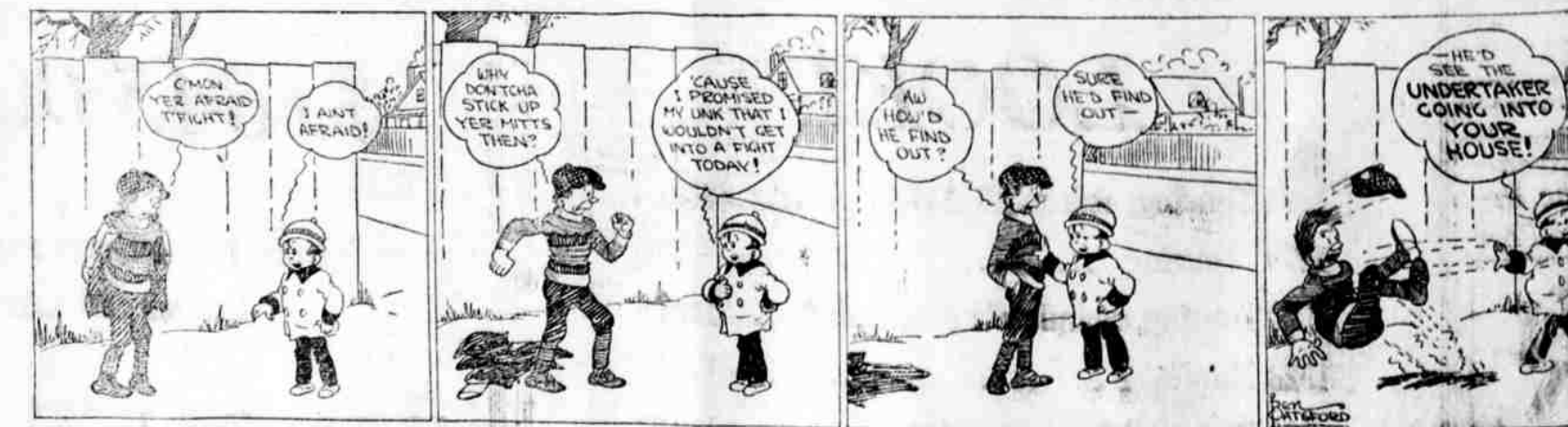
