

# GAGHAGEN HAS RECORD MONDAY

## 21 Liquor And Traffic Law Violators Face City Police Judge

Police Judge Gagghagen experienced a busy day Monday, the busiest in fact since the Fourth of July holidays, when 21 arrests were made in the city on charges of everything from 'canned-beat-articles' to vagrancy of two maids from Chillicothe.

The number of warrants sent into the judge reached 21, although at a late hour Monday only 14 had not yet in their appearance.

Leslie Bergeson paid a fine of \$100 when arrested by Patrolman Patterson on charges of driving an automobile when in an intoxicated condition. The arrest was made Sunday.

Another violator of the "driving while intoxicated" code was J. E. McKimie, who was given a fine of \$100 or 50 days in jail. McKimie was given the board and room when he failed to provide his fine.

Possession of intoxicating liquor cost F. Oscarson \$50 when with A. Hildman, he was arrested within three blocks of the city hall Sunday evening. Oscarson provided his fine. Hildman was booked on the same charge and another \$50 was placed in the city coffers.

A. Anderson paid a \$20 fine when arrested Sunday afternoon for being drunk.

Gust Nystrom contributed a \$20 bill to the city when he paid a fine for being intoxicated.

Patrolmen passing by that section of the city behind the K. D. building sensed a party and found two men and two dusky maids frolicking in the woods. Lawrence Sloan was charged with being drunk and also booked on a vagrancy charge. He failed to provide his \$20 fine and is spending the next 20 days in jail. The two Indian girls, Etta Charley and H. M. Johnson are lying in the city jail, recovering from their intoxicated condition and facing a jail sentence of 12 days when they failed to put up their \$20 fine on charges of vagrancy. The fourth member of the party was dismissed when found he was sober and without liquor in his possession.

The usual run of police gnat in regard to the traffic violators made up the remainder of the 14 who appeared before Gagghagen. Crater lake park company truck paid a fine of \$1 for improper parking.

Two tourists experienced an example of Klamath Falls hospitality when they were dismissed on charges of which they were ignorant. J. Davis, who parked improperly was dismissed as was A. E. Anderson, who left his car in the safety zone.

W. Rigney paid a fine of \$2 into the city treasury yesterday when he was arrested for an auto violation, driving without a tail light.

S. E. Wyand was fined \$5 for speeding on an intersection in the city business district.

## Decrease in Crops Is Gov't Forecast

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(United News)—Government crop estimates announced Monday by the agricultural department show a decrease in the yield of every grain crop except corn and oats. The condition of the corn crop August 1, was put at 75.8 per cent, compared with 86.4 per cent a month ago. Total production is

expected to be about 2,750,000,000 bushels, an increase of more than 500,000,000 bushels over 1924. Winter wheat is expected to run 416,000,000 bushels compared with 509,000,000 bushels last year. The condition of spring wheat was 73.5 per cent indicating a yield of 263,000,000 bushels, 20,000,000 less than last year. Oats will show an increase of nearly 200,000,000 bushels. Other grain crops are about the same as in 1924.

## Intoxicated Indians Stir Up Reservation

Klamath Falls has nothing on the little reservation town of Chillicothe when it comes to week-end "activities." Perry John, one of the wild boys from the Pampas when he has a pin under his belt, caused quite a commotion over the week-end and is now reclining 25 days in the county jail, on charges of being drunk and disturbing the peace to a great extent.

In the other end of the town Monroe Ball was keeping up his end of the game and he is resting also in the confines of the county prison for the space of 12 days. Ball was booked on charges of being drunk and disorderly. The arrests were made by Constable Shadley of Wood River, the sentences imposed by Justice of the Peace R. C. Spink.

## KLAMATH MAN LOSES SIGHT OF ONE EYE

Word was received from a San Francisco hospital today that Rosco Largent, chef at the Owl cafe lost the right eye as the result of the accidental self-inflicted wound sustained when the breech blew out and the bullet, striking the head, when Largent was practicing marksmanship on his ranch last week. Pieces of the brass casing of the bullet were found lodged far into the eye, making it necessary to remove the eye permanently. Largent is recovering from the wound and will be released from the California hospital later in the week.
