**CHARLIE CHAPLIN SICK**  
NEW YORK, New York hospital-ity has proved a bit too much for Charlie Chaplin, the movie star. The comedian is confined to his hotel room here, suffering from ex-haustion and a severe cold.

**HURRICANE KILLS 10**  
AMSTERDAM, Holland—At least ten persons were killed and 300 in-jured during a five-minute hurri-cane, which virtually razed two vil-lages and a town in eastern Holland Monday night. The villages of Lang-bow and Zeeland were almost de-stroyed.

**CANAL BUILDER TESTIFIES**  
BOSTON—Maj. Gen. George W. Goethals, builder of the Panama canal, testified in Superior court here Tuesday that in his opinion the fatal collapse of the notorious "Pick-wick club" on July 4, in which 44 lost their lives, was caused by the crumbling of a concrete pier under a side wall.

**TEXTILE WORKERS RIOT**  
LONDON — Eight Chinese were wounded during a cotton mill strike riot at Tientsin Tuesday, according to a dispatch to the Central News. Chinese police fired 200 shots dur-ing the trouble, which followed a mass attack of Chinese strikers on the Yungta mill, Chinese-owned, but managed by Americans.

**70 ALIENS SMUGGLE IN**  
TAMPA, Fla.—United States cus-toms officials of Tampa Tuesday seized the two master schooner, Phauloula, on information that the vessel on June 19, smuggled into this country from Cuba a party of 70 Portuguese who were lodged in the county jail, charged with illicit entrance into the United States.

### LOCAL HEALTH UNIT NURSES OFFER EXPECTANT MOTHERS FINE COURSE

Free Advice And Educational Literature Campaign Of-fered Prospective Mothers By County

It has been said that to become a mother is more dangerous than to be a soldier in a front-line trench. While this is something of an exaggeration (particularly in states like Oregon, where the peo-ple live under good conditions) it does remind us that motherhood is a much more dangerous under-taking than it has any right to be. In 1924, in Oregon 108 mothers lost their lives in giving birth to children. It is certain that a large proportion of these deaths was un-necessary, and would not have oc-curred if the proper precautions had been taken.

During the same year, 828 in-fants died. Many of them could have been saved if their mothers had had a better understanding of their care, especially during sick-ness. Education of mothers and mothers-to-be would save many lives—both their own and their children's. For this reason, the Bureau of Child Hygiene of the Oregon State Board of Health has prepared a series of letters to pro-spective mothers, which are sent monthly before the baby comes, and for four months thereafter. These letters take up, in a sim-ple way, the things a mother should know and should do to prepare for her baby's coming. They advise her of the precautions she should

**AIR CHEAPER THAN RAIL.**
