### 8 KILLED AND 40 WOUNDED IN RIOT

LONDON, Aug. 12.—Eight persons were killed and 40 were wounded when 800 soldiers clashed with 10,000 Chinese strike rioters at Tientsin Wednesday, according to a dispatch to the Central News. Many Chinese are reported to have been drowned when they leaped into the river to escape the soldiers. Panic swept through the strikers' ranks as the soldiers moved against them.

Order was restored only after hundred of rioters had been arrested.

After raiding Chinese owned, but American managed cotton mills, the rioters turned to the Tientsin mills and smashed the machinery. Damages are estimated at about \$1,000,000.

Trouble began Wednesday when soldiers began rounding up participants in Tuesday's riot at the Yungta mills, during which eight were injured and the mill partly wrecked. The Tuesday disorder was the result of a Chinese effort to compel mill workers to join a strike.

#### Wealthy Rancher Kills Baby Daughter And Self

RED BLUFF, Calif., Aug. 12.—While his wife and three children looked on, Balthazar Zimmerman, well to do rancher, killed his two year old daughter and then committed suicide.

Nothing unusual had been noted about the man's action before the killings. He had been sitting with the family group when he suddenly arose, seized his youngest child by the legs and running outside with her dashed her head against the sidewalk. Zimmerman then ended his life with a shot gun.

#### Roseburg Congressman's Condition Is Improved

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—Binger Hermann of Roseburg, former congressman from Oregon, and at one time commissioner of the general land office at Washington Wednesday night was reported as in a favorable condition at St. Vincent's hospital where he had been brought earlier in the day.

Mr. Hermann who is 83 years old was brought to Portland by his son, Elbert Hermann, attorney of Roseburg.

#### DEBT PROBE DEADLOCKED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Negotiations for settlement of the Belgian war debt to the United States ran into a deadlock after an all-day discussion Wednesday, and it appeared that a critical stage had been reached. One member of the American commission stated that if a solution of the present disagreement over terms was not reached at the meeting Thursday, he feared the negotiations would break off.
