**Plane Left Behind

INGTON, Aug. 14.—Leaving their badly damaged plane behind, the two men of the MacMillan expedition hopped off from the plane at Eiah, Greenland, and attempted to establish a base from which they hoped to set up an expedition for their dash into the "blind spot."

The plane which ventured forth was the NA-1 and the NA-2 was injured so badly by the pounding of the waves that the anchorage at Eiah was feared she was running completely, leaving her two to carry on the expedition the great area pole.

The second mishap to the expedition was a flight Thursday night from the end of Beistad fjord, compelled to turn back because of engine trouble, according to reports received by the Nantuxuk society here.

The two planes reached the end of the Beistad fjord, but were unable to land because of the strag winds.

At the water pounding the NA-2 opened her seams, and the two forward compartments went down by the bow. The wings touched the water, and the engine compartment along with the engine and was later hoisted by the crew.

**SLAYER YOUTH MAY
GET ONLY 4 YEARS**

SEDALIA, Mo., Aug. 14.—Everette Adams, 17 year-old murderer of Prof. Alden Clawson of Lodi, N. Y., may serve less than four years in the state reform school in explanation of his brutal crime.

Despite the efforts of the prosecution to place a charge of first degree murder against the boy, leading criminal attorneys of the state agree unanimously that Missouri statutes forbid the trial of a person of his age in the criminal courts.

With the arrival of his mother here from Wilmington, Ohio, Friday afternoon and the more cheerful attitude taken by his father and Wilkerson, the young murderer seemed greatly encouraged and talked at length of plans for his defense.

**Demented Daughter
Kept in Wood Cage
By Timid Parents**

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14.—(United News)—A Mexican couple, ashamed to have their neighborhood know the existence of a demented daughter, kept the girl locked in a wooden cage for years and fed her as if she were an animal.

The strange situation was discovered here Friday when two police officers entered the home of Maria and Hegino Seanez, forced open a locked door and found Josefa Seanez, 23, lying naked on the floor of a specially constructed wooden cage.

The parents, recently from El Paso tearfully explained that the girl had been "sick in the head" since birth and that they did not want the world to know about it. "We gave her good care," the parents cried, "we gave her very good care."

At the psychopathic ward of the general hospital where the girl was taken physicians said she was in excellent health and apparently had not been subjected to any ill treatment.

"The girl was removed solely because we feared a fire in the frame structure, where the Seanez family lives," Police Captain Herman Kline said. The chief further explained that if the parents had been wealthy and able to furnish her a comfortable place to stay that she would have been permitted to remain with her parents.
