SEATTLE HARBOR MAY YIELD GOLD

Big Corporation Files To State Today Asking Mineral Rights

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 14.—Extraction of gold from the mud of the Seattle harbor area will be undertaken by a company of Seattle capitalists. It was indicated today when an application was made to the state land commissioner for mineral rights.

The application asked permission to lease the mineral rights of the entire harbor area of Seattle, including all adjacent waterways and tidelands.

The application was made by Judge C. H. Hanford and John E. Boyer, of Seattle.

The plan is to raise mud from the tide flats by dredges and remove gold from it by an amalgam process.

Officials of the land department say that although there is no question about the presence of gold in the mud of the tide flats, it is doubtful whether it can be taken out in sufficient quantities to pay.

Captain Dohm of the department said that he had extracted gold from the mud, while a student at the University of Washington, but that he could not obtain more than a dollar's worth of the metal in a day.

MALIN PAPER TO START IN WEEK

ALTURAS, Calif., Aug. 15.—A. M. Thomas, secretary of the Klamath irrigation district and other organizations in the Tule lake country, arrived in Alturas yesterday on business for the Woolgrowers association of which he is also secretary.

Thomas is one of the best informed men on the Klamath country that the editor of the New Era has had the pleasure of meeting. He is in a position to know a great deal about the resources, railroad developments and other matters pertaining to the future of that

section of the country. Thomas says the railroad war between the Southern Pacific and the Hill lines goes merrily forward with the outcome still very much in doubt. He intimated that if the Southern Pacific would come out flat-footed and guarantee the people of the Tule lake district a ple of Tule lake district a through railroad it would probably change their attitude on the railroad question which has, in the past, been frankly antagonistic to the Southern Pacific. Like all the communities involved the people of Malin and that district are trying to look out for their own interests.

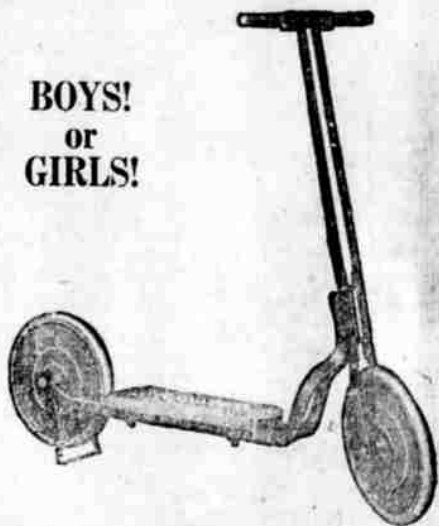
