## Among The BOOKS

### "INTERPRETER'S HOUSE" NOW BEING WIDELY READ

Friends of Struthers Burt, who  
clamor for more from the favorite  
author, have recommended the book  
"The Interpreter's House" as one of  
his most cleverly written works, a  
book in which may be found depth  
and clearness, reading light enough  
to balance the underlying deep  
thoughts which prevail.

"There he went on till he came  
at the house of the interpreter,  
where he knocked over and over;  
at last one came to the door and  
asked: 'who was there?'"

"'Sir—here is a traveler—'"  
"Then he took him by the hand  
and led him into a very large par-  
lor that was full of dust because  
never swept."

From those passages of Pilgrim's  
Progress, book 1, is based the plot  
of Struthers Burt's novel.

A recent interesting review has  
been found which will appeal to  
those who will find the book in the  
Klamath Falls library.

"Gullian Eyre has come to the  
point where some sort of interpre-  
tation of life has become his imper-  
ative need. The youngest son of a  
wealthy New York family, he has  
been allowed to follow his own in-  
clinations throughout his youth and  
early manhood. His father alone  
among the family connections hav-  
ing the perception to see, in his  
'wildness,' the stirring of unusual  
energy of character. Now, at thirty-  
five, having served through the war,  
having made a serious attempt to  
orientate himself by writing poetry

and taken a less serious dip into  
the diplomatic service, he comes  
back home "not because he wanted  
to—but because he could think of  
nothing else that would quiet the  
vague restlessness that had over-  
taken him." His readjustment into  
the warp of family, business and  
social claims; his inner drive toward  
some satisfying answer to the eter-  
nal query: "Is there beauty yet to  
find?—and certainty? and quiet  
kind?"—these are the themes of  
"The Interpreter's House."

### "BEAU GESTE" and "SHAKEN DOWN"

Two interesting books found on  
the shelves of the Klamath Falls  
public library are "Beau Geste," a  
novel of the mysterious type which  
deals with the fortunes of fate in  
the French Foreign Legion, and  
"Shaken Down," a novel of San  
Francisco life, written by Alice Mac-  
Gowan and Perry Newberry.

Percival Christopher Wren is  
known to few, a very few, who have  
read even extensively. But with  
the publication of "Beau Geste," he  
has become an intimate personage,  
whose mind has created one of the  
cleverest creatures of modern liter-  
ature.

Wren supplies the opening thrill  
of the story by attempting to solve  
with the readers' assistance, the  
reason for the fort at Zinderneuf,  
in the middle of the French-African  
desert, manned with dead soldiers,  
placed upright at their posts. The  
disappearance of the dead "com-  
mandant" and one of the corpses  
leads one on with breathless anxiety.

In "Shaken Down" those familiar  
with the Nob hill of San Francisco  
will find a novel worth an after-  
noon's pleasure. A literary gem, as  
several have classified it, worthy of  
consideration, and at least a review.

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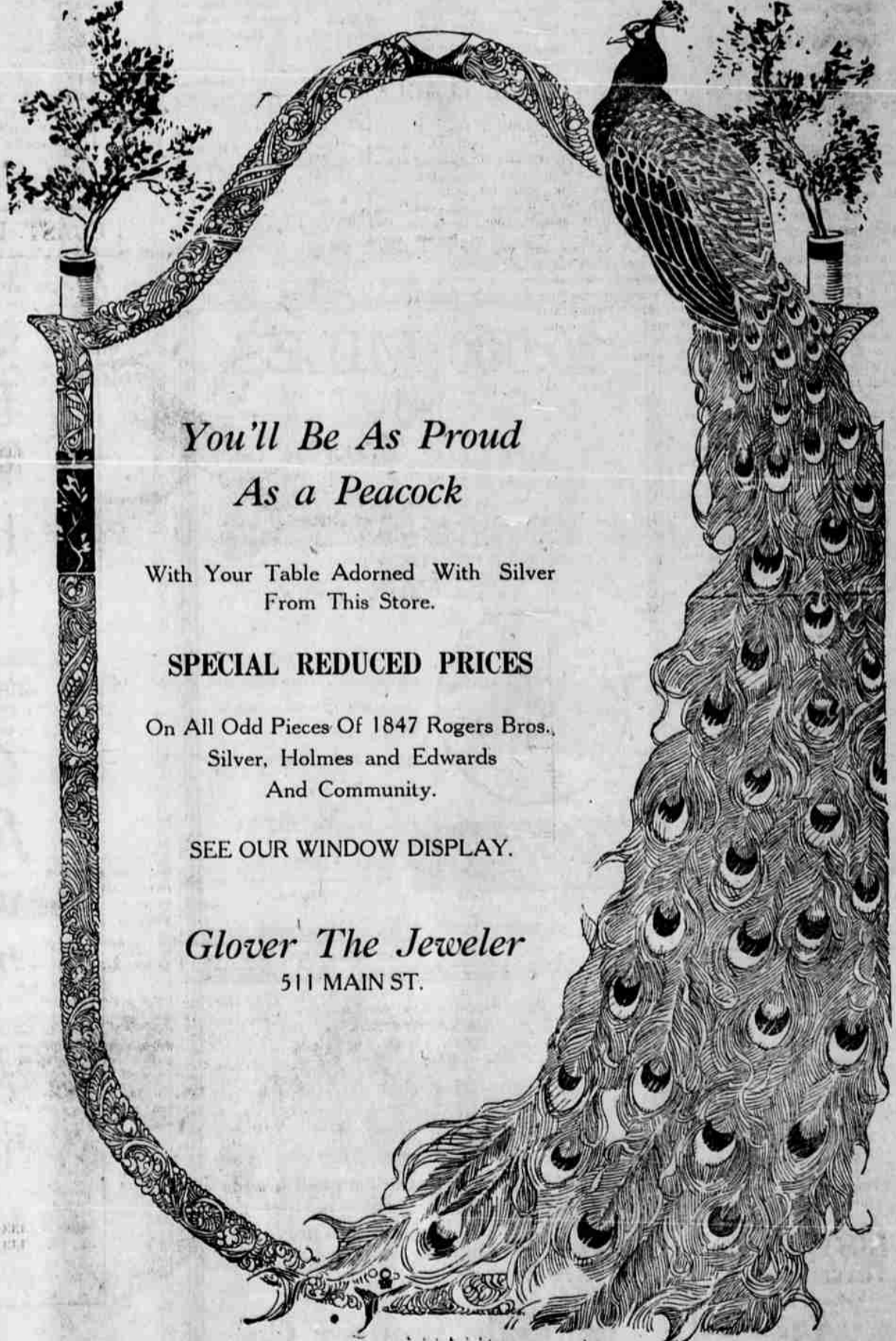
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
