\$20,000 Midland Project Will Be Surfaced In Early Spring

Authorization of advertising for bids on the construction of a new bridge across Last river at Harpold's dam and the grading of 5.2 miles of the Midland market road from Miller Hill school house to Midland came from the county court late yesterday.

Final discussion of the two projects before advertisement, was held at the meeting of the county court on Saturday afternoon.

Both projects will be completed before winter. Approximate cost of the Midland market road project will be \$20,000. It is the plan of the court to allow the grading to settle during the winter in order to be in good condition for surfacing in the spring.

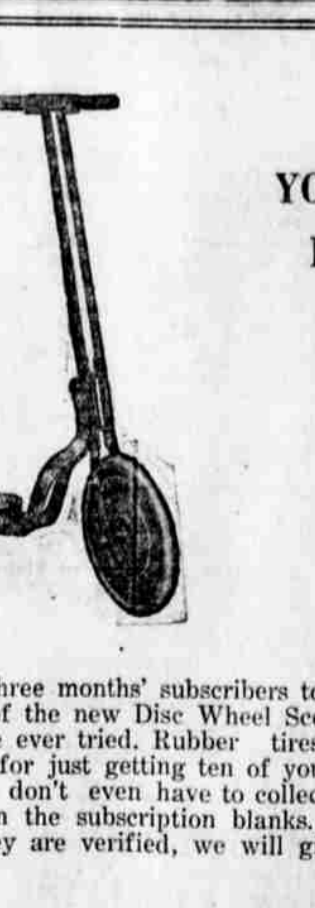
