that was that. A suggestion voiced in a letter from Roy Klein, state highway engineer, that the city of Klamath Falls cooperate with the county in remodeling the bridge over Link river, dividing Main and East Main streets, was referred by the council to its street committee.

Bridge Repairing Klein had suggested that the county take care of the bridge proper, and that the city provide for the walk for pedestrians. The plan, obviously, did not meet with the approval of the city attorney and as a result, the council's action was deferred.

Between 2500 and 3000 automobiles and trucks in the vicinity of Klamath Falls are to be tested for proper light adjustment, in line with the new state law, but the Crater Service station, for one organization, is temporarily stumped for a means to provide a headlight adjusting plant. The council last night denied its request to erect such a plant within the city's fire limits because of the fact that the structure necessarily would be of cheap construction.

It was indicated that the building probably will be built outside the fire limits.
