

LOCAL FANS CHARTER SPECIAL TRAIN TO WEED

Pelicans Cinch Second Place By 11-8 Victory Over McCloud

HEAVY SLUGGING OF PELICANS AND STEADY HURLING OF MOHLER WINS

Bayness Steals From First To Home On Successive Pitches; Three McCloud Hurlers Fail To Check Batfast; McCloud Threatens In Sixth

A terrific batting offensive early in the game that ran up a big lead for the locals. One bad inning—the sixth—when every Pelican seemed to forget Klamath was contending for the pennant, the result of which threw a scare into the 1200 onlookers, and the final tightening up and pulling together process, which gave the locals a clean victory. Those were the things that presented the thrills to the fans Sunday when Klamath registered an 11 to 8 win from McCloud.

Aside from the one bad inning, when three consecutive errors filled the bags, and a home run by Farley of McCloud scored a quartet of counters, the Pelicans played an airtight game.

They were on their toes every minute. The game was replete with flashy work of the reorganized infield. On the offensive the Pelicans batted everything the three McCloud pitchers had to offer, totalling 15 hits for the afternoon's work.

Daring Base Running

The daring base running of the locals won its way into the heart of the grandstand. The boys are as good as Weed, and if they don't win next Sunday it will be the breaks of the game. Frenchy Bayness accomplished the feat of stealing from first to second, from second to third and from third home, at intervals while Silgar was striking out three men in a row for McCloud. On the steal home, Bayness took a big lead off. He lit out on Silgar's arm, and slid into the plate before Burton could tag him.

The other feature of the game was the playing of Baird, McCloud shortstop. Baird accepted eleven chances in the field, mostly hot ones, without a slip.

Lefty Hurler Good Game

Mohler pitched a wonderful game. Not more than one hit was let by him in any one inning. In the sixth, when three errors in a row filled the bags, it took the heart out of him, as it might any hurler. Farley cracked out a home run, and Mohler was relieved by Street. Street was unsteady yesterday, and it was only his tightening up in the drastic pinches that saved the game.

Infield Is Improved

The new infield is a decided improvement over the old permanent lineup. Clinton fielded his position at second base better than "Red" Watts. On the other hand, Watts played a flashy game at shortstop in the place of Norwest. His one error was easily excusable. His whip to first was speedy and accurate, and he got down after the hot ones like a veteran.

It is problematical who will pitch Sunday against Weed. Manager Glover, at any rate, is not going to announce the battery until just before the game starts.

Battling Siki To Be Kicked Out of U. S. for Stalling

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—(United News)—As politely as possible, the United States government Monday notified a distinguished visitor that United States of America wasn't quite roomy enough for him any longer and intimated that the folks back home in France and the jungles of Senegal would doubtless be glad to see him.

The distinguished guest is Battling Siki, the black prize fighter, who knocked out Georges Carpentier in Paris two years ago and whose name, furthermore, is inscribed on the valor rolls of the French army as Louis Phal, which is correct.

The immigration officers arrested Siki on a technical charge that he had violated the immigration laws by overstaying the period for which he was originally admitted to the United States—one year. He was taken to Ellis Island, where he furnished \$1,000 bail to insure his appearance at the island for a further hearing late this week.

Siki might have remained here indefinitely had he been a person of gentle decorum. However, he made himself obnoxious to the New York fight commission by clowning in his latest match here, a harmless and hilarious episode, which nevertheless was adjudged to be a slight upon the dignity of the prize fighting profession.
