**EX-KLAMATH MAN
RUNS FOR OFFICE**

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 19.—Educational forces of the state stepped into politics today with the announcement that Charles A. Howard, superintendent of schools of this city and national director for Oregon of the National Educational

association, would be a candidate for the republican nomination for state superintendent of public instruction.

J. A. Churchill, incumbent, will resign to become head of the Ashland normal school after serving more than 12 years.

Howard, is well known throughout the state, having been engaged in educational work here since 1907 when he graduated from Ba-

ker (Methodist) university in Kansas. He was formerly president of the state City Superintendents' association and of the Oregon State Teachers' association. From 1907 to 1911, Howard taught in Klamath county high school. 1911 to 1917 superintendent of Coquille schools, 1917 to 1920 principal of Eugene high school and for the past five years has been superintendent at Marshfield.
