## NEW STATE GAME WARDEN SAYS POLITICS ARE TO BE BARRED IN DEPARTMENT ADMINISTRATION

E. F. Averill, who was recently chosen by the Oregon State Game Commission to succeed Captain A. E. Burghiduff as state game warden, has addressed a letter to the various employes of the state in the game field which sets at rest the ill-founded rumors which have been in circulation to the effect that politics would play an important part in the conduct of the department.

The letter is self-explanatory, and is given in full for the benefit of those interested in the work of the commission and its employes:

"To All Employees of the State Game Commission:  
"It is very apparent that an organized attempt is being made to disrupt work of game department by circulating statements to the effect that the entire force of employes is to be reorganized on a political basis. I have been instructed by the Oregon State Game Commission to advise you that all such statements are false.

"The commission at its meeting held August 19 authorized me to say to you that the force is not to be reorganized on a political or any other kind of a basis, and that so long as each employe does his work faithfully and efficiently, refrains from every kind of political activity and does not violate any of the laws of the state or nation, his services

will be continued. Also that the state game commission as now constituted is determined to carry on with renewed vigor and a singleness of purpose the work of propagation and protection of game birds and game fish in order that there may be more and better hunting and fishing throughout the state.

"I realize you have been more or less disturbed by the reports that you were to lose your positions, and that you have thereby been hampered in the performance of your duties. I certainly hope you will take the statements contained in this letter at their face value, and from now on give undivided attention to your work.

"Kindly remember that no political activity of any kind, or violation of any state or national laws, will be tolerated. So long as this is borne in mind and you render effective service you can rest secure in the knowledge that your employment by the game department is safe.

"For myself, I ask only the same loyal co-operation that you extended my predecessor, and I feel sure that as we become better acquainted our relationship in the work will be mutually pleasant and satisfactory. Cordially yours,
