

MANY HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENTS OVER WEEK-END

Sprague River Man Most Seriously Hurt Is Improving

Art Strudwick, of Bray mill, Sprague River, suffering from a cranial fracture received in an automobile accident Sunday, was reported to be improving last night at the Klamath Valley hospital. John Thomas, who was with Strudwick, was unhurt.

A man who gave his name as Tom Murphy was another who figured in the several accidents reported over the week-end. Murphy, arrested by City Officer Collins on a charge of driving while drunk, entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to serve 60 days in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$100. He was accused of driving through a plate-glass window at Area's garage.

Lockie Is Injured

Floyd Lockie, who lives near Keno, suffered two fractured ribs and severe bruises when his automobile steering gear broke between Klamath Falls and Keno and caused his car to turn over. Lockie was attended by Dr. J. R. Barr, Klamath Falls physician. Bert Jacobson, who was with Lockie, escaped unhurt.

Adam Sharpek, unconscious, was removed to the Klamath General hospital after a wreck which occurred on the Keno road about nine miles from Klamath Falls. In the collision with another machine, Jack Selpack, who was with Sharpek, received a cut on the face.

Yreka Woman Hurt

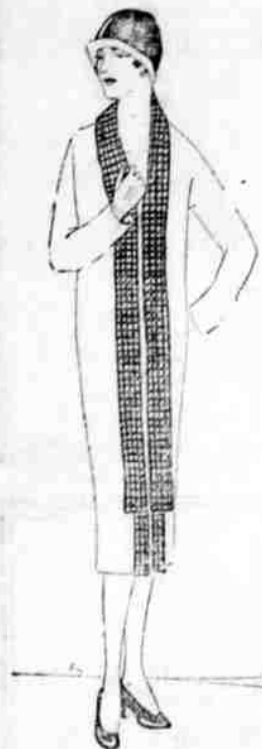
