

BAR ASSOCIATION TO ASSIST JUDGE ON CIVIL DOCKET

Cases pending in the circuit court for Klamath county is now, and for some considerable time, has been in a congested condition, and many civil cases are now pending upon motions and demurrers filed many weeks, and even months previous hereto; and a great many other cases are at issue for trial, and pending so at issue many months, and in some cases more than two years previous hereto; and

"Whereas, the aforesaid condition of the civil docket in said circuit court of Klamath county renders it impossible for the members of the bar of this county to dispose of litigation, and thus serve their clients properly, resulting, also, in a great dissatisfaction of, as well as injury to the litigants whose cases are thus pending and undisposed of as aforesaid,

"Now therefore, Be it resolved by the Klamath Bar association that a committee of three members be appointed by the president of this association for the purpose of ascertaining the true condition of the civil docket of the circuit court in this county and for the further purpose of devising and recommending ways and means whereby this bar association and the members of the bar generally may assist the said circuit court, and the clerk thereof in the more speedy disposition of any and all cases now pending before said court, whether upon motions or demurrers, or for trial upon the merits. And be it

"Further resolved, that they be and are hereby authorized to investigate and report to this association such recommendations as in their judgment may seem proper in the premises."

Members of the committee named were: C. C. Brower, J. C. Dutnic and W. P. Myers.

THINNEST SKYSCRAPER
CHICAGO—What is believed to be the thinnest skyscraper hotel in the world is shortly to be built by Chicagoans half way between Galport and Biloxi, Mississippi. The hotel, a \$20,000,000 structure, will be but 500 feet in length and only 40 feet wide. The unique design was selected due to the fact that this arrangement will permit everyone of the hotel's 400 rooms to overlook the Gulf of Mexico.

Local Telephone Manager Returns

Portland was considerably wrought up during the recent search there for escaped convicts from the Oregon penitentiary, and Eugene is elated over its recent action in voting a bond issue of \$175,000 for the purchase of a tract to present the Southern Pacific for its railroad shops, according to F. Ray Dunn, manager of the Klamath Falls branch of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company. Mr. Dunn yesterday returned from a week's visit in Portland and Eugene.

While in Portland Mr. Dunn conferred with high officers of the company regarding the situation in Klamath Falls. Recently the company has made many extensions in this city, and more are contemplated in the near future, Mr. Dunn said.

EXPERT MELON GROWER ENTERS

Harry L. Mills of the Hilderbrand district called at the office of the fair board yesterday morning and made entry of many kinds of melons all grown on dry land. Mr. Mills is one of the pioneer farmers of the Hilderbrand district, and one good look at his productive farm will show even an inexperienced observer what good tillage methods, careful choice of location for air and soil drainage will do toward contributing to the success of the farmer. Mr. Mills picks certain locations for certain vegetables and truck crops, some times these little pockets are only a few rods in extent but the bountiful returns and thrifty appearance of the plants show what reward may be expected. He tried over 40 varieties of watermelons before arriving at the kind best suited for quick maturity and returns on his particular type of soil.

KLAMATH MAY GET NEW JAIL

Following close on the statement of District Attorney E. L. Elliott that there is "no proper place in Klamath county where a youth can be confined," came the prediction yesterday that, as soon as possible, the county court will provide a bastille where persons of any sex or age may be lodged.

Twenty-one thousand dollars is soon to be available as the result of litigation involving the county and the First State & Savings bank, defunct, it was said yesterday. It was declared that, as soon as the funds are obtainable, the county court plans to provide a jail suitable to the needs of the community.

The situation in Klamath county, persons well advised declared, is one that needs immediate attention. When a woman is arrested officers are at a loss to dispose of her case, and when a minor is taken into custody they know not what to do.

Just where the new jail is to be erected, nobody is able to predict. The jail in the court house, it was explained, is extremely crowded at the present time, and even the inmates there should be given quarters better than the ones now provided.

UNION MINERS PLAN WALKOUT CAMPAIGN

HAZLETON, Pa., Aug. 25.—Preparations for the possible necessity of calling a strike of anthracite miners, were made Tuesday night at a meeting of the general scale committee of the United Mine Workers, following the failure of a neutral "citizens' no strike" committee, which had earlier Tuesday vainly pleaded with the miners to continue negotiations with the operators.

Confesses Bombing Home for Sympathy

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 25.—(United News)—Millson W. Downs, brother of suspended Councilman Charles E. Downs, confessed late Tuesday that he had exploded the bomb which wrecked his house, in order to create sympathy for his brother, accused with Councilman Joseph Fitzpatrick of accepting \$2000 bribe money.

After several hours of grilling, Downs, who suffered a broken rib in the explosion, admitted he dynamited his own house to help out the "kid"—his brother.

Downs was knocked unconscious by the dynamite charge he had placed under his bed. A post, flung a hundred feet by the blast, crushed his rib as he was escaping. The two former councilmen, charged with soliciting and accepting \$1,000 each to vote for a proposed tunnel improvement, appeared in court Tuesday and asked for adjournment of their trial until Thursday. The plea was granted.
