Ray Taber In—Ray Taber was a business visitor in Klamath Falls the first of the week from the Southern Oregon Lumber company mill.

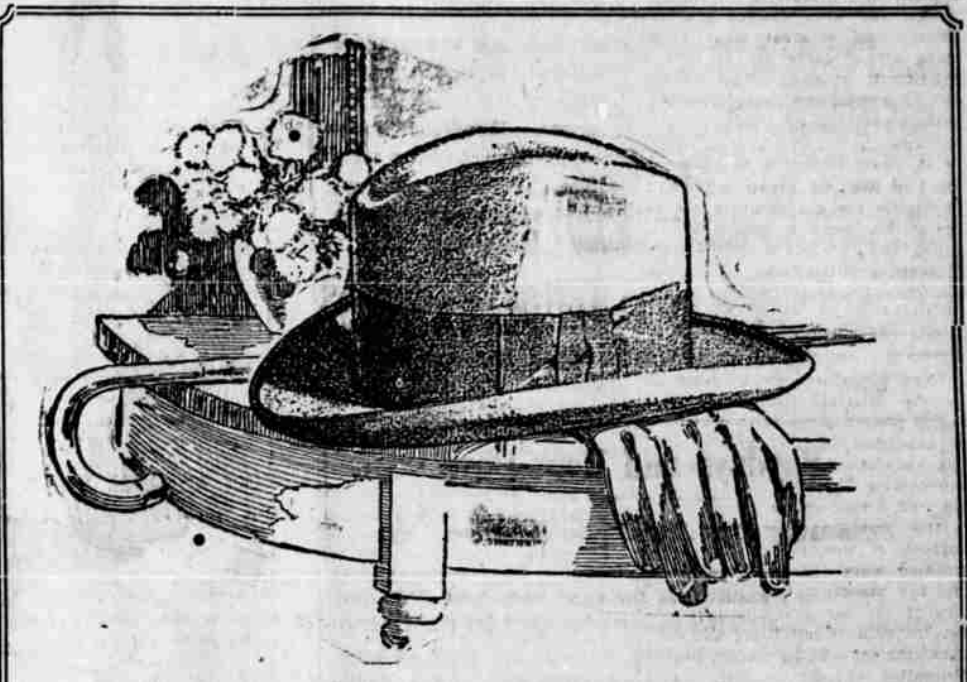
Chamber Votes To Drop Off "Falls"
