

ALLEGED MORAL PERVERT UNDER CLOSE SCRUTINY

In the future Kenneth North, alleged to have committed a criminal assault on a three-year-old baby girl, is to be constantly under the eye of Sheriff Burt Hawkins.

That was decided yesterday after Justice of the Peace Kendall had had a conference with several persons interested in North's case. North was originally released on his own recognizance, but the status of his case was changed after Judge Kendall had carefully considered all details of his alleged crime.

Many persons expressed satisfaction today when they learned that North's incarceration had been arranged. They held that a man, accused of such a crime, should not be turned loose on the community.

Although North will not be jailed with other criminals in the county jail, he nevertheless will be in the county courthouse at all times, until his trial is held. Judge Kendall said. Judge Kendall felt that it would be unfair for him to pursue any other course than the one he decided to follow.

Although they declined to make any official comment, it is known that several other county officials felt as did Judge Kendall.

North, who is said to be in his 17th year, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Joe Kimsey and was said to have made a complete confession.

He was employed by a local box factory.

KLAMATH GIRL TO RETURN FROM S. A.

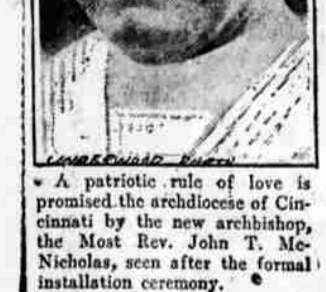
Friends of Miss Ada Porter who has spent the past five years of her life in South America will be pleased to learn of her expected return to Klamath Falls in the immediate future.

WILBUR CENSURES NAVAL OFFICER

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—Secretary of the Navy Wilbur has administered a sharp and severe reprimand to Lieut. Andrew L. W. Gordon, for his conduct as judge advocate of the court martial, which recently acquitted two navy nurses on charges of bringing liquor into this country from Cuba.

Wilbur's reprimand, contained in a letter to Gordon, followed the secretary's recent disapproval of the acquittal. The two nurses, Ruth M. Anderson and Katherine C. Clancy, signed statements that they knew packages in their possession on their return from Cuba, contained liquor. As they were exonerated by the court martial, nothing further can be done, despite Wilbur's disapproval.
