sources and its problems, by personal observation.

Let me say that Southern Pacific people take a pride in the growth of Klamath Falls and the region tributary to it. This pride is because it is an example of what is accomplished when the manufacturers and men of business generally and the carriers serving them work together with the object of making an industrial and manufacturing center in response to the natural resources of the place. Everything we have done, everything we have planned and everything we are planning have in mind Klamath Falls as the industrial center. There has been no change in that from the beginning. It is true that litigation, to which this company was subjected through no fault of its own, growing out of other litigation in which we became subsequently involved, gave us no option but to delay the execution of our plans, but Klamath Falls can bear witness to the promptness and zeal with which we resumed the execution of our plans at the first moment we were permitted to do so, and these plans are being pursued to completion.

Asks Co-operation

If the business interests of Klamath Falls and ourselves are permitted to continue this relationship of mutual understanding and good-will so that both may in good faith carry out the plans already outlined to the mutual advantage of both sides, all will go well. But we have to work together. This is the only way the great sums of money necessary to carry on this campaign of railroad construction can be obtained, for it is the only way it can be made reasonably profitable. We have faith that our profit will come with the continued growth of the country thus responsive to our efforts in common. I say in common because it should be borne in mind that a fair return upon the very large investments necessary to create the comprehensive local and through transportation service we have planned, will require us to receive all of the revenue from the traffic of the territory to be served. Vast sums consumed in construction to develop this region can yield a profit to this company only by providing business for our main lines. The justification for spending such sums is that the new mileage becomes a source of traffic for the Southern Pacific lines which furnish the money to build that new mileage.

Marine Wouldn't Take A Bath; Given 2 Years

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—(United News)—Another one of the "picked men" of President Coolidge's marine guard has come under official disapproval among other things, for a refusal to bathe.

In the past week two marines have been held for court martial for neglect of duty and it was disclosed Friday that another, private George E. Beam, is in the naval prison at Portsmouth, N. H., to stay two years for various forms of misconduct, including his opposition to a bath.

Last June Beam decided to "tell them" what he thought of the first to fight branch of the service. He so bitterly attacked the leather neck brigade that he was arrested and charged with conduct prejudicial to good order and discipline.

Smarting under his arrest, Beam broke jail, was absent without leave for 14 hours and refused to obey orders of his superior to take a bath in the nearby ocean at Swampscott, Mass.

wall guards should be employed other than able-bodied men between the ages of 25 and 50 years, who have good eyesight and are expert rifle men. It calls attention to the fact that of the three guards who were overpowered in the turnkey's office, one was 56 and two were 65 years of age.

Friction Among Officials
Uniforms for guards and a system of training which would imbue them with a sense of their responsibility is recommended. Inspection of the wall guards upon posting of each relief is urged. "No

inspection of this character is in effect," the report says.

Lax prison discipline is unfavorably reported. Evidence of fraternizing between employees and prisoners were uncovered. That no prisoner be given trusty privileges until he has served his minimum sentence is another recommendation.

The report further states that "the effectiveness of the force of prison guards is further reduced by lack of harmony and by friction among prison officials."

2 NEW LAKE COUNTY LUMBER MILLS OPEN

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Aug. 28.—Trial runs were made this week on two of Lake county's largest sawmill operations when the mills of Edgerton & Adams at Camas Creek and the Lakeview Mills and Timber company at Crane Creek started up for the first time. The two operations are among the largest yet to locate in Lake county and when

regular production has begun will increase the output of the Lakeview district by close to 100,000 feet daily.

The Edgerton & Adams mill is located 15 miles east of Lakeview on the Lakeview-Adel highway and will cut timber from the Crane lake district.
