

# GIANTS FINALLY WIN A GAME, BUT DO PIRATES; SENATORS WAKE UP

### Hoyt Allows Browns But 3 Scattered Hits But Loses To Rookie; Athletics Continue On Downward Grade

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—(United News)—The duty of the Giants in the world series, which has strained enthusiasm and the vocal fixtures of New York for one week every autumn since 1921, now seems to have lifted.

The Giants are taking the count. As in the case of some fighters, the Giants are receiving a long count, and are giving a lot of time in relinquishing the championship of national league to the Pirates of Pittsburgh.

## BERLENBACH TO MEET M'TIGUE

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Mickey McTigue, who lost the light heavyweight championship of the world to Paul Berlenbach this summer will profit by the misfortune of Jack Delaney.

McTigue has been selected to face Berlenbach in a return bout on September 11, instead of Delaney, who has fallen critically ill in a hospital in Bridgeport.

When Berlenbach beat McTigue, the New York boxing commission insisted that Berlenbach give Delaney a chance at the title because Delaney stopped Paul before he became champion.

Friday afternoon, when Tex Rickard was notified that Delaney could not hope to keep the date against Berlenbach he telephoned McTigue and found him willing to take a return match with the chance of regaining the championship.

Berlenbach and McTigue each has had one fight since the bout in which the title passed to the former Olympic wrestler. They both fought and beat Tony Marullo of New Orleans.
