Low over Midshipman's point, headed toward San Francisco, came the two Hawaiian planes and their three escort planes. They were flying so low that they barely cleared the narrow strip of land. Once again over the water they wheeled toward the sea. They still were so low that the grim pile of buildings on Alcatraz Island, the army prison, hid them from view as they passed.

Harbor craft set up a shrill acclaim of whistles as the planes gathered speed in their rush seaward. The great machines gained altitude readily. The yellow bow of the PN-9, No. 1, flashed out in front as the formation passed by the towering headlands that form the golden gate.
